Witsken attacked the Sampras serve again in the seventh game, this time breaking with a backhand topspin return, ten held to even the set at 4-4.

Sampras eliminated many of the unforced errors in the second set and outrallied Witsken to take a 4-1 lead. Sampras pounded in so many



The Peruvian made effective use of the dropshot in the first set but Agassi broke first to lead 5-3 and then broke again to win it 6-4.


Somewhat winded, Arraya laid on the comic banter in the second set as his game began to fail him.



beat the Duchess of Norfolk Eleven by 32 runs in the traditional tour opener at Arundel yesterday, according to BBC monitored in Dhaka late last night.

Pakistan, led by Javed Miandad, rattled up 252 for the loss of two wickets in their 50 overs thanks to a fine 104 by opener Aamir Sohail. In reply, the Duchess of Norfolk XI finished on 220 for two wickets when their overs ran out.

The left-handed Aamir Sohail, who retired after making 104, put on 86 runs for the first wicket with Rameez Raja before Raja was out for 23. Then newly-appointed vice captain Salim Malim, who had such a nightmarish World Cup, appeared to have regained his batting form and picked up from where he had left off last season when he had such a brilliant stint with Essex, scoring nerly 2000 runs in the English county season. Malik hit a stylish 84. Skipper Miandad also made a good beginning, scoring a repid unbeaten 31.

Pakistan's utility player Astf Mujtaba, who returned to the team after languishing in the wilderness for quite sometime, picked up both the Norfolk wickets with his gentle leftarm spin.
