Batexpo -92 begins in capital today

Backward linkages needed to sustain garment export, urges BGMEA chief

About one hundred foreign buyers are expected to join the Bangladesh Apparel and Textile Exposition, "Batexpo" -92, to begin today at Hotel Sonargaon in Dhaka.

Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia is expected to inaugurate the exposition, sponsored jointly by Export Promotion Bureau (EPB) and Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA). It will continue till May 8.

Majority buyers will come from Hong Kong, USA and the

European Community (EC). The Vice Chairman of EPB, Waliul Islam addressing a press conference on the occasion said the exposition would help facilitate the foreign buyers to see for themselves the quality of Bangladesh products and take on-the-spot decision on purchases from here.

The President of BGMEA Mosharraf Hossain while addressing the press conference stressed the need for setting up backward linkages in order to sustain the phenomenal growth of the garment export.

Hossain mentioned that the garment sector used 700 million square meters of fabrics annually and added that it proved that there was a vast scope for composite textile mills producing quality and competitive fabrics.

Hossain stressed the need for foreign participation in setting up textile mills for quality fabrics.

He further speculated that "With the conclusion of the the export earnings of the

garment sector would reach 1.4 billion US dollar at the end of 1992. He said that efforts were underway to market Bangladeshi garment in Japan, Australia. Middle East and the Commonwealth

Independent States (CIS)

Reflecting on the Bangladeshi garment export situation in the global market, he said that the country was the fourth largest exporter to the USA, 10th largest to the EC and the 9th largest to

Canadas. BSS adds: Mosharraf Hossain said Bangladesh now exports garment to 20 countries of the world. He said the garment industry with a modest beginning at the fag end of seventies, within a decade has become an epoch making industry contributing about 56 per cent to the total export earnings in 1991.

The earnings from this sector stood at about one billion US dollar in 1991

Hossain said the garment sector which has opened up a big opportunity for establishment of backward linkage in-

dustries, has also created enormous opportunities and activities in the resectors of the economy.

Besides accessories indus try, sectors like banking, insurance company, shipping, tourism and transportation are also thriving alone with the growth of the garment industries, he pointed out.

Hossain said although the number of garment industries exceeded one thousand, the number of workers has not increased much more than that two to three years back. In reply to another question. Hossain said the minimum wage in garment industry where women constitute 85 per cent of the workers is Taka 630. After six months most get more than Taka 800, he added.

In reply to a question Walful Islam said the government is considering offering financial assistance to the garment industry to help enter the emerging markets in Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS), now facing foreign exchange constraints.
