It has come to our notice that during the last few days a number of daily newspapers covering different stories involving our company's name directly and indirectly concerning the above subject. We have observed these news are contradicting one with another and a total distortion of facts. Unfortunately, such statements were made baselessly without our authority and even without any sorts of communication with us whatsoever. For reasons stated above we consider it expedient to make the following statement concerning the above subject in order to remove all sorts of ambiguity and doubts from the minds of all concerned:

That on 5th May, 1992 we despatched 140 employment passengers with all valid papers and visas to one of our employer in Jeddah by Biman Bangladesh Airlines Extra Section Flight No. BG 107. But unfortunately, the Immigration Department in Jeddah suspecting the genuineness of these visas returned back all the workers on the same flight.

Immediately thereafter we took up the matter with the Saudi Embassy in Dhaka and the matter is still under their investigation. As such the reason what was stated in the Dailies that for the reasons of Rubber stamp these workers came back cannot be accepted as a fact as we are aware that along with our group in the same flight other workers also came back even having Exit and Re-entry visas.

So, we wish to reiterate here that the above matter have already been referred to the Saudi Embassy in Dhaka and we expect that there would be a solution very soon concerning the despatch of these deportees.
