## JU students, transport workers clash: 20 hurt

A series of clashes between transport workers and stu dents of Jahangirnagar University left at least 20 people injured, several vehicles dama ged and transport communication disrupted on the Dhaka-Aricha Highway Monday.

Several rounds of talks between the University authorities and transport leaders held at Gabtoli Bus Terminal failed to restore the situation till 10 pm Monday.

Clashes stemmed from a road mishap Monday in which a truck collided with a university bus at Baliapur area, Savar, about 18 kilometres off Dhaka at 1:45 pm.

When the truck bumped against the bus which was going towards Dhaka from the university, some agitated students damaged the truck and injured its helpers.

Immediately after the incident, when four buses of the university were passing through Amin Bazar and Gabtoli areas, known as a base of transport workers, the workers attacked the buses with lethal weapons leaving several students and teachers injured. The workers also damaged

the buses and detained them at Gabtoli. However, in the wake of

talks between the two groups the damaged buses were released last night. Meanwhile, another group

of students went on picketing

near the university gates on

The agitated students sei zed six trucks, two buses, and five auto-tempos plying on the highway and detained them on

The students also set three trucks ablaze on the campus last night in protest against the attacks on the students

Police were deployed outside the campus but they could not rescue the seized vehicles from the campus till last night.

Following the attacks and counter attacks, hundreds of teachers, students and applicants who went to the campus to sit for the admission tests in the first year honours courses,

Later the university teachers escorted by police left the campus last night in a special

Meanwhile the university authorities in an announcement postponed today's (Tuesday) admission tests. They also said that the date of the admission tests would be announced later.

The leaders of Jahangir nagar University Central Students Union (JUCSU) and other students organizations of the university in separate statements condemned the attacks and urged the Home Minister and Communication Minister to take stern action against the offenders.

## 6 kidnapped Karachi businessmen rescued

KARACHI, May 11: Sindh Chief Minister Syed Muzaffar Husain Shah has been spared great embarrassment by the efficiency of the province's much-maligned, not unjustifiably though, police force.

They have been able to rescue six city businessmen who were kidnapped on Friday afternoon. They were members of a group of 13 young businessmen, all in their thirties, who had gone for an outing at an agricultural farm of a doctor friend, at Gadap, some 50 kilometres north-west of here.

At about 5 pm the kidnappers entered the swimming pool at the farm where the young businessmen were taking a leisurely swim. Thee dacoits hauled up 11

of them and herded them into a Suzuki van. Two of the party escaped because at that precise moment they were not in the pool.

The kidnappers also took away the keys of four cars in which the picnickers had come from Karachi. At some distance from Gadap the kidnappers abandoned the getaway car and divided the abducted people and themselves into three groups. Each group consisted of two of them and four of their hostages, on two motor cycles.

The kidnapped people had only their swimming costumes on them, and nothing else, not even shoes. Panicked, tired and dazed as they were, they were being taken towards the forests of Dadu district.

Early in the morning on Sunday, the kidnappers saw a car coming from the opposite direction. Thinking it was a police car, one group of the kidnappers panicked and hur riedly fled the scene leaving their four hostages behind, in the bark, unfamiliar jungle. In the meantime the two

businessmen who had luckily escaped, had alerted the lawenforcing agencies. The police rushed towards Dadu, sur rounded and sealed the gen eral area. The Rangers had also joined them. But they were un-

able to locate either the abduc tors or their victims until late

last night. They found six of the

sparsely-clad victims lottering in the jungle; they were hungry, dehydrated and utterly exhausted and were in a trauma. One of the seven had died while in captivity. His charred body was later found at a hilly terrain in the district. It is surmised that the kidnappers burned his body at one place and later shifted to some other. The mystery of his death will be solved only when the rescued people say what exactly they passed through.

So far they have only said that the kidnappers had left them on Sunday morning as a result of the pursuit by the police and the Rangers. They kept walking until the police found them and took them to a nearby village where they were given first aid, food and clothes.

The operation was successful undoubtedly due to the pressure mounted by the combined force of Sindh Police and Rangers, who used helicopters for aerial surveillance. The happy ending to the most sensational kidnapping case in the province has to a great extent restored the good name of the police, which had fallen to a very low depth ow ing the several unsolved cases of kidnappings and murders not to speak of other crimes.

The case had created a sen sation in Karachi. The businessmen were considering whether to go on a strike to highlight the insecurity they have to live with. Only last week one businessman was murdered in broad daylight right in front of his hosiery mill in SITE and another, steel dealer, was kidnapped from his shop in a busy city area. And the number of those who have been victims of robberies, hold-ups is too many to recount. They were already agitating over these incidents when the news of the abduction of 11 businessmen came as a severe shock.

#### Fighting leaves 17 dead in Bosnia

At least 17 people were killed and 67 others wounded in 24 hours of fighting Sunday and Monday, Health sources in the war-torn Republic of Bosnia-Herzegovina said. The victims, from the capital Sarajevo, Trnovo, to the Southeast, and Zenica and Travnik in the Northwest, were killed or injured in clashes between 2:00 pm (1200 GMT) Sunday and the same time Monday, reports AFP.
