





TCCB accepts sweeping changes



LONDON, May 20 English cricket chiefs insisted change is for the better - despite the opposition of eight countries to a new

domestic package and the views of players led by England eaptain Graham Goock, reports

A special meeting of the Test and County Cricket Board at Lord's on Tuesday voted 11-8 for wholesale change to the summer programme, to be brought in immediately for next season and for a trial period of three years.

The main proposal of the Murray report, for a 17-match championship of four-day cricket, won almost unanimous support.

Those opposing the package were not named, but are believed to include Essex, Yorkshire, Somerset, Glamorgan, Northamptonshire and Gloucestershire.s

Constitutionally, there was no chance for any amendments to be voted on these needing to have been submitted two

But the 18 countries, plus the MCC and the minor counties (who abstained), did insist on a review of the new structure taking place after three years and not five.

Financially, some countries fear the loss of two guaranteed home Benson and Hedges ties carly in the season. As a straight knock-out, they argue in some years they will not get a single home tie, especially if eliminated in the first round.

And many players are opposed to a longer Sunday game. Gooch said: "I would have liked it to stay the same. It's quite demanding to ask * sides to play a 50-over game in the middle of a hard four-day match."

But TCCB ehtef executive Alan Smith said the Cricketers' Association - the Players' Union — was fully consulted by the Murray report.

Smith said: "This exercise was not marketing-led, except we had marketing experts like Brian Downing and Sir lan Maclaurin on the working

"Overall, the approach has been "let's get the product right first. This is a momentous day for English cricket." "We have had a champi-

onship based on three-day cricket for more than a hundred years - but this new package is designed to strengthen our cricket and help produce better interna tional players.

"We had a very healthy debate in a 90-minute meeting, but I'm confident all the countries went away determined to make this new programme work."

Mike Murray, the Middlesex chairman who led the eight-man working party set up in August last year, accepted there remain some individual county problems. But Murray indicated cen-

tral reserves available to coun ties each year from the TCCB could be increased to offset any losses which result from the reduction in the amount of county cricket played - the championship programme is slimmed from 72 days to 68.

dependent States at next month's European soccer championship finals for the first and probably the last time, reports Reuter. Vladimir Salkov, assistant to

chief coach Anatoly Byshovets, on Tuesday named 15 foreignbased starts in a short list of 25 for the finals in Sweden, although he said a definitive squad of 20 would not be announced until UEFA's May 31 deadline.

Out go most of Valery Lobanovsky's Soviet side who Anished runners-up in the last championship but failed dramatically in the 1990 World Cup finals in Italy.

The main survivors from those sides are two Glasgow Rangers team mates, defender Oleg Kuznetsov and midfielder Alexet Mikhailichenko, and midfielder Sergei Aleinikov from Italian side Lecce.

The backbone of the new side comes from clubs ranging from Portugal to Israel, who have lured ex-Soviet players abroad in the past few years with lucrative hard-currency contracts.

Benfica of Portugal provide three players - Vasily Kulkov, Alexander Mostovoi and Sergei Yuran. From Espanol of Spain come Dmitri Galyamin, Dmitri Kuznetsov and Igor Korneyev. all formerly with Cska of Moscow.

UK hooligans, beware!



LONDON, May 20: British soccer hooligans who cause trouble at the European football

ehampionships in Sweden next month may be banned from travelling to other matches, reports Reuter.

The British Home Office said on Tuesday that a new government order came into effect on Monday to allow courts to stop trouble-makers travelling to matches abroad.

"Let this be a warning to the hooligan minority not to cause trouble," Home Office minister Lord Ferrers said in a statement.

The special football spectators order is the latest attempt by Britain to ensure its soccer supporters behave themselves overseas.

British police said on Monday they had sent Swedish authorities a list of 200 known hooligans they fear could cause trouble at the championships. Undercover police are also being sent to infiltrate sus-

pected groups of hooligans. Police and soccer authorities have worked to improve the image of British supporters in Europe after violent clashes between rival supporters in the mid-1980s

Britain was banned from European competition for six years after 39 people died in the Heysel Stadium disaster in Belgium in 1985 when thousands of people tried to flee fighting between supporters of Liverpool and the Italian team Juventus.

More than 6,000 English fans are expected to follow their team in Sweden, where England play their opening match against Yugoslavia in Malmo on June 11.

Under the travel restrictions, a court can prohibit anyone convicted of a football-related offence during the European Championships from attending future matches. They would be required to report to police stations when the matches are on.



Mummy display may lead to boycott of Olympic Games by Africans



BARCELONA, May 20 : The mumm ified body of an African tribal chicf is still on display in a Spanish museum, bringing the potential boycott of the Barcelona

step closer, reports AFP. The Town Council in Banyoles, 100 km north of here, where the Olympic row ing competition is to be held, are refusing to remove the exhibit from the local museum,

despite requests from the Games organisers, COOB. Local Mayor Joan Solana has received a letter from COOB executive Josep Miguel Abad, asking that the mummy be withdrawn from display for the duration of the Games, from July 25 to August 9.

But the Mayor announced he had no intention of intervening in the matter.

The International Olympic Committee reacted to a request from Jean-Claude Ganga, president of the Association of African National Olympic

Committees over the affair, asking the organisers to write to the Mayor.

The matter came to light several months ago when Haitian-born Doctor Alfonso Arcelin, who lives in the region, threatened to mount a campaign calling for African nations to boycott the Games if the mummified exhibit was not removed.

Ganga, who organised the African boycott of the 1976 Olympics in Montreal over a New Zealand rugby tour of South Africa, called the mummy's presence a "degrading spectacle" and "a shameful and

unacceptable exploitation." The Mayor initially agreed to the part of the museum containing the munimy being closed for the duration of the Games but the IOC felt that was not enough and that the entire museum should be closed throughout the Olympics. Abad's letter referred to the IOC meeting in Seville on May 9, when they noted "numerous protests" from several national committees over the presence of the mummy in a town hosting Olympic competition.

He called on the council to "consider the matter and its implications, particularly on an

international scale. But the town is standing firm, asserting that the IOC "has no authority whatsoever to put pressure on the Town Council", while the local inhabitants are set to demonstrate their solidarity with the officials and denounce what they see as the "cowardice" of trying to conceal the mummy

during the Olympics. The council decided unanimously as long ago as last November not to allow the mummy to be removed. "That's seven months we have had to think about it and we're still clear in our minds about it,'

one councillor announced.
The mummified body of the Botswanan tribal chief was exhumed and brought to Spain at the start of the century and has been on display, in a standing position and with a spear in its hand, among wild animals since 1915.
