

BANGKOK, May 22: Thai Prime Minister Suchinda Kraprayoon has resigned, high reliable sources said here late today, reports AFP.

No official confirmation was

immediately available. The sources also said that Suchinda, the target of massive demonstrations since he became Prime Minister in early April, had an audience with Thailand's constitutional monarch, Bhumibol Adulyadej, this evening.

Suchinda, a former armed forces chief seen by opponents as little less than a military dictator, was believed to be about to leave the country, the sources said. They did not indicate where he was to go.

Reuter says, leaders of Thailand's government coalition said today they supported changes to the constitution which would make uncleeted Prime Minister Suchinda Kraprayoon step down. "All five coalition parties

have reached a unanimous de-

cision to amend the constitution," Montree Pongpanit of the Social Action Party told a news conference attended by all five leaders. The decision follows the worst political unrest in two decades. At least 40 people

#### Shantibahini Mantu, Majlish lead guns down two more

CHITTAGONG, May 22: Members of Bangladesh Security Forces today recov ered two bodies of non-tribals from Barabil under Matiranga Upazila of Khagrachhari hill district, reports BSS.

According to official sources here, when a group of daily non-tribal labourers were working in the field yesterday suddenly the tribal insurgents fired on them indiscriminately from nearby jungle. On receiving the information, the security forces appeared there but no one was found dead on the spot that moment.

However, the security forces through their special raid recovered from deep jungle the bodies which were identified as Mohammad Abdul Hye (30) and Mohammad Hossain Ali (35).

The hands of the victims were tied behind and there were several marks of bullet injury on two bodies, the source said.

KABUL, May 22: Heavy shelling shook Kabul today af ter overnight fighting between Uzbek militia and fighters of holdout Mujahideen leader Gulbuddin Hekmatyar left an unknown number of casualties. reports AFP.

Heavy shelling from the city's suburbs to unspecified locations outside Kabul continued for almost 40 minutes Friday as residents said the activities were confined to the Darul Amand and Karte Naw provinces.

Today's fighting flared after reported attacks by the militia on Hekmatyar's Hezb-i-Islami force in the suburbs of Chehalsatoon and Tapa Maranjan, a spokesman said. "We are in a defensive post-

tion, but if necessary we will retaliate," said Hezb-i-Islami spokesman Qutbuddin Hilal in

He said the overnight fighting "lasted two to three hours" but added that he had no ready reports of casualties from either side.

The fresh fighting between the two rival groups followed the announcement of a five point peace accord by a Mujahideen council providing for a withdrawal of all opposing forces from Kabul.

The commission headed by Maulvi Jalaluddin Haqqani also announced a permanent end to the fighting and ordered withdrawing fighters to deposit their heavy guns and tanks with the new Islamic government in Kabul.

"We spoke to Haggani and we are waiting," the Hezb spokesman said.

Hekmatyar insists on the withdrawal of the lawless mili tiamen as a pre-condition to his joining the three-week-old interim administration.

The spokesman said the Uzbek militia led by former General Abdul Rashid Dostam wanted to "sabotage" the ac cord as it also seeks the with drawal of such "Mercenary" groups.

Meanwhile, Defence Minis ter Ahmed Shah Masood, an arch-rival of Hekmatyar, told a Pakistani delegation Thursday night that he was ready to withdraw all forces from Kabul provided he was assured the city would not be attacked in the future.

# Santiago begins indefinite fast today

MANILA, May 22: Presidential candidate Miriam Defensor Santiago said Friday she will begin an indefinite fast to protest 'wholesale' fraud in the May 11 presidential election, reports AP. More than 100 of her sup-

porters gathered Friday night at the Media Citizens Quick Count center to begin a 'vigil for truth' as their anti-graft champion dropped to third place in the presidential race. Mrs Santiago said in a

statement that she would enter

a suburban Mantla hospital Saturday to begin fasting to the death if necessary. She said she would subsist on a liquid diet until the government of President Corazon Aquino stops the alleged

election returns. With just over 55 per cent of ballots counted Friday, Media Citizens Quick Count, a private group authorized by the government to count the vote, said Ramos was leading the presidential race with 3,131,746 votes, or 24 per cent of the votes counted

Industrialist Eduardo "Danding Cojuangco was second with 2,269,812 votes or 17.5 per cent and Mrs Santiago was in third with 2,238,382 votes or 17.3 per cent.


