# Shishu Park turns risky

Watch out ! Keep an eye on the small cabins in which your

kids go up on the Ferris wheel. Some of the fun rides at the country's only recreation park for children - the Shishu Park in the capital - have become obsolete and dangerous.

Officials of the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) said that all the 11 recreational machines at the park were running two years after expiry of the safety warranty. The 10-year war-

ranty ended in 1990, they said. Any accident because of the worn-out machines would involve lives of innocent children, they warned.

Sources at the park said on condition of anonymity that machines of at least six of these fun rides badly needed thorough overhauling and their By Masud Hasan Khan

steel structures replaced.

Besides the most precarious Ferris wheel, there are flying saucer, chair tower, electric train, merry-go-round, roller skates, trampoline, electric cars, baby bicycles, archery and flower cups at the 15-acre Shishu Park

Park sources said except for a few changes in 1990, no major maintenance job was done since opening of the park in They said plastic covers,

metal ropes, nuts, bolts were replaced on many occasions but the metal structure of these rides were not changed.

The foot-boards of some cabins on the Ferris wheel became worn- out and were replaced, the sources said, but not the steel rims, the main

axle or the bearings on it. According to sources, the DCC spends nearly Taka 12 lakh every year for mainte nance of the machines at the park which, they said, was too inadequate.

"Almost all the machines here rotates or moves involving friction. . . and it is very likely that these will wear and tear in time," one source at the park said, adding that it was the high time these were replaced unfortunate incident occurred
