that Bangladesh could earn Taka 20 thousand crore a year by exporting computer service and data entry.

The students put forward a set of demands to the democratic government for the promotion and development of computer technology. The demands listed inclusion of computer in the curricula from school up to university, waiving of tax on computers used in educational institutions and taking up a definite programme to take Bangladesh at par with Newly Industrialised Countries (NICs) within five to seven years.

The Media Against Tobacco' in 1994, "The Economics of Tobacco" in 1995, "Sports and the Arts Without Tobacco" in 1996, The United Nations and Specialised Agencies Against Tobacco" in 1997.
