The shots were heard from the Jagannath Hall, SM Hall and Zahurul Hug Hall areas of the campus. The incident was suspected to be related to the feud between two factions of Awami League-backed Chhatra League (M-I).

Gunshots were being heard every night on the campus since Wednesday last, on
