cover but you are certainly inclined to choose a product by its look. Creating an image is what marketing is all about. A large part of this is graphic designing. As the world becomes more and more competitive, selling has become a kind of art form relying heavily on visual impact. The four month workshop at the Fine Arts Institute in Dhaka, conducted by Professor Barry Mirenburg, a Fulbright scholar, was geared to introduce to students, new dimensions of contemporary graphic design, an aspect of art relatively unexplored in Bangladesh. The conclusion of the workshop took the form of a two day exhibition from May 27th which showed the works of the Bangladeshi students who had studied under Mirenburg

The exhibition itself, would probably not hove seemed particularly spectacular to the lay person. The posters were done with simplistic themes in basic colours of blue, green, red and vellow. Made with cut out paper with logos of the Shishu Park or Balda Gardens, the works had a look of naivete. But according to Miren-

burg, it was this very simplicity that made them so special. Said the professor of Parsons School of Design in New York, the purpose of using uncomplicated designs and basic colours was to create a deep visual impact. "In a world where we are constantly being bombarded with so many intages, he commented, "we need more powerful


and immediate images in order to have lasting impressions. This in turn translates into more simple forms which are captivating and expressed through these primary colours." This type of work he added, was reminiscent of the work of renowned impressionist painter Andre Matisse. Matisse, whose work has greatly influenced Mirenburg, was extremely avante garde. Being a paraplegic, restricted to a wheel chair, he used famous Jazz Series done in vibrant colours.

But how much artistic talent was really re quired for this kind of work? Plenty according to Mirenburg. "You have to have a very good sense of shape and colour because you are so dependent on correctness of form and composition without any extraneous details. The result, in many ways, is more difficult to achieve since it has to communicate a specific effect,

Mirenburg, who has won more than 125 awards from organisations such as the Art Directors Club, the American Institute of Graphic Arts and Metropolitan Museum of Art, has been in this field for over 18 years. The rest of his curriculum vitae is even more impressive. Apar from an MA in advertising and graphic design and doctorate in art and art education, Mirenburg also has an MBA and Bachelors Degree in Sociology and Psychology. Moreover, since 1986, he has been the president and creative

World No Tobacco Day observed

Efforts to be made to ban smoking through passing bill in Parliament'

Works Minister Rafigul Islam Miah Sunday called for waging a social movement throughout the country against smoking of tobacco, reports

He was speaking as the ers sitting around a smoker. chief guest at a discussion marking the observance of "World No- Tobacco Day" at the VIP lounge of the Jatiya Press Club here.

Jointly organised by the Health Education Bureau and the Consumers Association of Bangladesh (CAB) the discussion was addressed by Deputy Minister for Health Sirajul Haque as the special guest.

Presided over by the Director General of Health, Prof MA Siddique, the discussion was participated by Director of Bangladesh Cancer Institute Prof MA Hye, Prof Nurul Islam of IPGMR, Principal of Government Titumir College Bazlur Rahman, Chief of Health Education Bureau Nazrul Islam, WHO representative Myo T. Hwe, President of CAB Borhanuddin Ahmed and General Secretary Sarwar Jahan.

Underlining the health hazards of smoking tobacco, the Works Minister said conscious section in the society and voluntary agencies like CAB could play a pioneering role in motivating the smokers to give up their bad habit.

Rafiqui Islam Miah who himself a non- smoker said efforts would be made to ban smoking through passing a bill in the coming session of the Jatiya Sangsad, particularly in the work places.

The Deputy Minister of Health, in his speech, described smoking as a money wasting bad habit and said a bill would be introduced in the coming session of Parliament against smoking in general and in offices and work places in particular.

Another report adds: Information Minister Barrister Nazmul Huda Sunday urged students and the youth to refrain from smoking for their own interest as smoking is in-

jurious to health. Speaking as the chief guest at a discussion, held in observance of "World No Tobacco Day" at the Notre Dame College auditorium here, the Information Minister advised the stu-

He said smoking should be avoided as it affects the smokers as well as the non-smok-

The boats were impounded while they were carrying-out smuggled goods. Thirty eight foreign flower vases (contraband items) were recovered from the boats and


Killings by Shantibahini in Rangamati slated

Candidates must be citizens of Bangladesh either by birth or by domicile.

Only those candidates who have passed HSC examination or its equivalent not earlier than the calendar year 1990, subject to fulfilment of the conditions (3) & (4) as under, are eligible to apply.

Candidates must have passed SSC examination of any Education Board of Bangladesh or its equivalent and obtained at least 50% marks on the average or equivalent grades.

Candidates must have passed HSC examination of any Education Board of Bangladesh or its equivalent and obtained at least 65% marks on the average in the subjects of Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry and minimum of 50% marks in each of these three subjects separately or equivalent grades in these subjects.

A merit list on the basis of the marks of Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry only of the HSC examination or the equivalent grades in these subjects will be prepared out of which only the first three thousand and five hundred candidates will be allowed to take part in the Admission Test examination. All the candidates in the three thousand five hundredth position having equal marks, will also be allowed to take part in the Admission Test examination.

SUBJECTS OF ADMISSION TEST EXAMINATION

The admission test examination will be held in the subjects of Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry only on the basis of the Syllabuses of HSC examinations conducted by the different Boards of Bangladesh in 1991. In order to test the suitability of the candidates some questions of basic and elementary nature on the subjects may also be set.

NUMBER OF SEATS:

Number of Seats:

The maximum total number of seats in the first year B Sc Engineering degree course in the Faculties of Engineering, Civil Engineering, Mechanical Engineering and Electrical & Electronic Engineering is 510 of which 3 seats are reserved for the candidates from Chittagong Hill Tracts and other Tribal Areas of Bangladesh. The maximum total number of seats in the first B Arch Course of 5 years duration is 50 of which 1 seat is reserved for the candidates from Chittagong Hill Tracts and other Tribal Areas of Bangladesh.
