Questions of his private life apparently made the witness annoyed and provoked him to argue. But quick came the Attorney: "No, you won't enter into any debate with lawyers, they are very powerful in the court.

The defence counsel cautioned the witness: There may be many more unpleasant questions . . . prosecution has told you one side of the coin.

Raise in tea exports can reduce trade gap: Pak HC

Pakistan High Commissioner in Dhaka, Anwar Kemal, has said that Bangladesh can reduce the trade gap between the two countries by raising tea exports.

Speaking on "Economic and Commercial Cooperation between Pakistan and Bangladesh" yesterday at the regular weekly meeting of the Rotary Club of Dhaka North, the High Commissioner said that there were ample "potentials" to improve the existing trade relations.

Bangladesh buys mainly rice and raw cotton from Islamabad while Pakistan's prime imports from Dhaka are jute and tea.

In recent years, tea exports to Pakistan have drastically declined.

Kemal suggested cooperation in garments and textile sectors saying that Dhaka could use Pakistan's textile machinery and raw cotton for these industries.

Pakistan is to hold a trade fair in Dhaka late this month which the High Commissioner said would be Pakistan's first single exhibition in any coun-

Dhaka imposes sanction on Serbia, Montenegro

The government has decided to impose sanctions on Serbia and Montenegro of the former federal Socialist Republic of Yugoslavia in compliance with an United Nations Security Council resolution, according to official sources in Dhaka yesterday, reports BSS.

The sanctions, imposed by Bangladesh, included interalta, ban on all trade and atr traffic and movement to and form Yugoslavia, excepting humanitarian cases, suspension of sports and cultural link and scientific and technical exchanges with these two countries, the sources said.

The UN Security Council has adopted a resolution on Sunday imposing sanctions on Serbia and Montenegro.

Meanwhile, the sources said, the Yugoslav mission here is in the process of being wound up and at present only one diplomat is posted here.

Viability of Osmania Glass Factory project questioned

An ECNEC decision giving go-ahead to the delayed BMRE of Osmania Glass Factory has offended the Industries Ministry which requested the authorities to revoke it.

Sources at the Industries Ministry told UNB that the ministry in a letter to the Finance Ministry Monday questioned viability of the project and requested a review of the decision.

The Executive Committee of the National Economic Council took the decision on May 20 for BMRE of the factory using a Belgian grant amounting to Tk 24 crore.

Though the grant was made in 1988, its utilisation has been much delayed to the resentment of the donor which threatened to withdraw the sanction of money.

Now the industries Ministry contends that the decision for balancing, modernisation, rehabilitation and expansion of the factory was based on wrong information. The Planning Commission's

estimate of 10 per cent inter-

nal interest on the grant will have negative impact on the company, which has 38 per cent share in the private sector, the ministry said.

"The rate of interest on the credit should be in favour of the company," the letter said suggesting refixation of interest at 2.5 per cent. Venting similar concern.

The report, based on the results of World Bank missions that had been in Bangladesh in May, August and December 1991, also suggests comprehensive institutional and fi nancial performance reforms. On the institutional re

forms, the World Bank calls for increased autonomy for the gas sector entities, while monitoring accountability through performance contracts: the establishment of a single, national gas transmis sion company out of the three existing companies to "streamline transmission operations and achieve transparency in finances"; the formulation of a national exploration policy and a decision on whether the Bangladesh Exploration Company (BAPEX) should be continued and what its role should be.

The other institutional reforms include "a renewed, vigorous campaign" to promote petroleum exploration with international companies, removal of government representatives from the Boards of the operating companies and a joint energy sector planning by the corporations dealing with power, gas and petroleum products.

On the reforms in financial performance, the report em phasises 'actions' on gas pricing policies, avoidance of excessive levels of long-term debt, the distribution companies' ability to collect their receivables and a sound policy for exploration.

The main objectives of the 'Gas Sector Review for Bangladesh' were to identify the key impediments to the sector's efficient and sustainable development and (2) recommend a monitorable set of priority actions to address these issues. An estimated 15.2 trillion cubic feet of remaining, recoverable gas reserves, the
