World losing thousands of species every year

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 2 Experts say thousands of the world's natural species are wiped out every year, many without ever having been detected by mankind, reports Reuter.

According to Michael Bean, a lawyer with the Washingtonbased Environmental Defence Fund and author of a book on wildlife- conservation law, between 45 and 270 species are lost to the world every day.

Another expert, Walt Reid of the World Resources Institute, also in Washington, says five per cent of tropical forest species alone are lost every decade. "Some say as much as 25 per cent," he adds.

If the figures seem a bit vague, it's a tribute to the diversity of life on earth. Scientists have only identified 1.4 million species. Anywhere from five million to 50 million may actually exist.

Most of these species, perhaps 90 per cent of them, come from tropical rain forests which, given deforestation, is one reason for the high rate of extinction.

Destruction of natural habitat is the greatest cause of species loss, the experts say, but the degradation range from water pollution to climate change. Broader problems in-

clude rapidly increasing populations, growing consumption and inadequate land distribu-

Hunting, which used to be a major issue, today threatens only 20 to 30 species, such as elephants.

A first step in addressing the problem of species loss is identifying those under threat in the first place. But it is a costly and lengthy process that can yield mixed results.

The United States, for example, has listed 700 species of plants and animals as being endangered within the country and another 500 outside.

By contrast Brazil, which has the world's greatest variety of trees, amphibians and primates, lists only 250. The country lacks the financial and other resources to make a more complete list.

Overall, the convention on international trade in endangered species, an international treaty, protects about 2,000 species such as whales, parrots and elephants.

After identifying endangered species, scientists say their habitats should be protected. "Parks are important. We are losing habitat so quickly we need to identify ar eas rich in species and protect them," says Reid.

organisations (NGOs) and social workers to come forward with specific programmes for the development of children.

In the welcome address, M Mokammel Haque, Member, Planning Commission and Chairman, JGUAG, said the new government hopes to facilitate rapid progress towards the achievements of the goals for the 1990s.

Cole P Dodge, representative of UNICEF in Bangladesh, said: "It is this creation of hope, through the launching of the National Programme of Action, that is a big success."

He appreciated the 'universal primary education, the resolution which was recently adopted by the government. "This NPA is a new dawn, a new reality for children in the coming eight years. This country is now set to achieve much more in the years ahead," said Cole P Dodge.

Other ministers present on the occasion expressed their appreciation of NPA and assured of full cooperation in the coming years.

The process of the preparation of NPA was initiated by the JGUAG in March 1991 with the formation of four working groups. These groups were one each for - health and nutrition, water and environmental sanitation, education, and social welfare.

The participants in these groups were drawn from different spheres of government bodies and development part-

The outcome of the discussions and recommendations of these working groups were then discussed in two review meetings. The NPAs were fi nalised at a JGUAG meeting in November 1991. Immediately afterwards, that is in December, the summary of the NPA was published under the title 'Progoti'.

There are six main goals of the NPA for children and development by 1995. First, the stress is to reduce infant mortality rate from 110 to 80 per 1000 live births and mortality rate of children below the age of five from 188 to 135.

The issue which is at par with infant mortality and child birth is the condition of the mothers. Hence, it emphasises to reduce maternal mortality ratio from 6 to 4.5.

Virtual elimination of iodine deficiency disorders and nutritional blindness from

Vitamin A deficiency should also be given importance.

The number of illiterates is increasing every year. So, importance should also be on to increase adult literacy rate (15-35 years) to 40 per cent with the emphasis on female

School attendance in Bangladesh is around 50 percent of enrollment or 38 per cent of eligible children. So, concerted effort is necessary to increase gross primary school enrollment rate to 85 per cent through formal schooling and non-formal edu cation of comparable standards with emphasis on reduction of gender disparities.

Universal access to safe drinking water and increase in sanitation coverage from eight to 35 per cent is another target of the NPA.

Women's literacy rate is half that of males. Efforts are needed to reduce gender disparities by integrating women into the mainstream of devel-

There are 14 million children under 15 in rural areas and about three million in urban areas who face acute

Enam Ahmed Chowdhury Secretary, Economic Relations Division, Ministry of Finance, in his vote of thanks on the occasion of launching the NPA said referring to the programme: "This is a cornerstone of national development effort. With UNICEF and other international donors and organisations, we hope this will bring about a better future and better development for our children."

Tk 7 crore EC food aid for Rohingyas

The Commission of the Eu ropean Communities has approved an allocation of 10,000 tons of cereals, valued at 1.46 million ECU (approximately 70 million taka), for distribution to the Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh, reports BSS.

This food aid will be channelled through the World Food Programme, according to press release of the European Communities in Dhaka.

This commitment is part of a special food aid programme for 1992, granted to countries which have been severely affeeted by drought or conflicts in different parts of the world.

extinct in another 40 years. The audit report on the State of the Environment just released by the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) says that "efforts to improve the environment depend mainly on eliminating poverty and wasteful habits of the very rich. The world's richest billion people consume the most resources and generate the most waste."

From 1970 to 1990, the population of the world increased by more than 40 per cent, about 1.6 billion people. In the coming two decades it is expected to grow by another 1.7 billion people, bringing the total to seven billion. Though the growth of popu-

lation is slowing, during the current decade the world will have to support three more people every second, almost 97 million a year. Demographers are of the opinion that this decade will see the largest increase in population in human history.' Increasing pressure of

population creates pressure on meagre resources. The invading population encroaches on lands and forests. This has already resulted in a telling effect on the natural environment and in the process women are facing more strains in collecting fuel, food and water for the family.

They are also facing difficulties in conserving income and cutting expenditure. There have been scientific and technological advancevehicles are produced and

ments over the years contributing to the life span of people, specially in ensuring a better life. Much of this progress has

been in the rich industrial countries, where people now expect to live until 73 and where only nine children out of 1000 die before the age of five. As against this, a South Asian expects to live 57, a Latin American 66 and an African only 52.

Population level and disease are linked. Besides, population increase limits the access to primary health care, sanitation, education and so on. When the survival of the

poor has become difficult, so is the case of many animals. Human activity is rapidly depleting the number of plant and animal species on the earth. Industry and agriculture depend on this biological di-

versity for many of their needs.

Conservationists claim, over the next three decades the number of losses are likely to increase to 15000 to 50000 species per year, or about 40 to 140 species per day. The craze for development

and energy. UNEP figures say "There are 600 million bicycles in China and India. Unfortunately for the environment, there are almost as many vehicles in the world -- roughly twice as many as there were in 1970. More than 80 per cent of all
