Indian army raiding Bodo hideouts inside Bhutan

GAUHATI (India), June 3: Indian army units have started operations against hideouts of tribal militants in southeastern Bhutan, across the border from the northeast Indian state of Assam, an official spokesman said today, reports Reuter.

A spokesman for the Assam government said that New Delhi had received permission for the raids from the Government of Bhutan, an castern Himalayan nation with population of some 1.4 million.

"Due to possible international complications the Indian army will not set up bases inside Bhutan. It will operate from its bases along the borders of Assam and Bhutan," he

A General connected with 'Operation Tiger" said it had

begun on Tuesday against the Bodo Security Force (BSF).

"Our operations are aimed at destroying the Bodo militant bases in that part of Bhutan," the General told Reuters.

The Bodos have been fighting since 1987 for their own state within India, complaining that the Assamese majority exploits them.

The General, who asked not to be identified, said BSF militants had five or six bases in the Bhairabkund and Samsungihongka areas of Bhutan, close to the Assam border. "From these bases, Bodo

militants regularly attack targcts inside Assam and so we had to do something about it", he said.

The Indian army is sending long-range patrols into the

southern Bhutan areas where the militants have bases. Backing them up the 'quick reaction teams' of 15-18 soldiers, ready to be deployed at

The teams have already hit two militant bases killing four militants and injuring several others, he said.

short notice, the General said.

"The patrols are to dominate the area and the quick reaction teams are meant for specific operations. Both may support each other," he added.

New Delhi had complained to the Bhutan Government about the BSF bases there, saying the militants used them to train and shelter members who regularly attack tea planters, security forces and political rivals inside Assam. officials said.

The General said the Indian army moved against the Bodo militants under a similar agreement with Bhutan for a brief spell last November, but most of them fled deeper into Bhutan.

"We got a lemon, nothing more," the General said, disclosing the 'liot Pursuit' operations for the first time.

But this time things will be different. We have much more information and we hope to have better coordination with the Bhutanese forces," he said.

The government in New Delhi and the Assam state government are holding talks with the moderate Bodo factions. but the BSF is determined not to settle for anything short of a separate Bodo state.

Rio summit opens Time to find new ways to use earth: Ghali

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 3: The Earth Summit opened today with a keynote address from UN Secretary General Boutros Boutros-Ghali to delegations from the 178 member countries, reports AFP.

The UN chief said that mankind had evolved from an era of conquering nature and that it was time to find new ways to use the planet for future generations.

An estimated 30,000 will attend the 12-day UN conference on environment and development which will be held 25 kilometer (15 miles) west

of Rio de Janeiro. Other keynote speakers

were to include conference general secretary Maurice Strong of Canada, King Carl XVI Gustaf of Sweden, Prime Minister Gro Harlem Brundtland of Norway and President Mario Soares of Portugal.

Negotiators will address seven critical issues: global warming, technology transfer, ocean pollution, forest protection, population control, the preservation of species and environmentally safe develop-

ACHIRANGA (Jaipurhat), June 3: Prime Minister Begum Zia has called upon all to resist the quarters which want to mislead and create division to jeopardise the development, reports BSS.

She was addressing a big public meeting here today organised on the occasion of the Achhranga re-excavation project under which a 25.50 acre pond had been re-excavated.

The Prime Minister urged the people to 'be vocal against the elements who want to destroy the uplift process.

The country could become an exporting nation with the successful implementation of the development programmes through the participation and cooperation of the people, the Prime Minister added. She said: "We have to main

tain good relations among our selves to carry forward the na tion towards the desired goals of reliance and prosperity at a faster pace."

The Prime Minister said her government wanted to make every individual of the country self-reliant through planned development programmes.

She said, "The government was encouraging rapid industrialisation side by side improving the agriculture sector.' The Prime Minister said

the government would encourage setting up small and cottage industries in the villages to strengthen the rural economy. In this connection, she said raising cattle and poultry could save huge amount of foreign currency spent every year in the sector.

Referring to the development of the women community, the Prime Minister said: "We have to realise the truth that women are the half of the population and no uplift efforts could become successful without their participation." Begum Zia said in the poli-

| BCCI may be refloated as Eastern Bank Ltd

Bank of Credit and Commerce International (BCCI) will be refloated as a new bank by August 12 after clearance from the World Liquidator in London, according to sources close to the Bangladesh Bank and the BCCI.

The refloated bank may be named Eastern Bank Limited. The World Liquidator has already reviewed the BCCI situation and expressed satisfaction, Finance Ministry sources said. However, clearance on

some issues is yet to come. The authorities will have to take a decision on the bank by August 12 as the one-year moratorium period of the BCCI ends on the date. Government will have to formulate new laws for further extension of the period.

According to the existing law the government can suspend the operation of a particular bank for six months and it can be extended by another six months if required.

A convening committee of the BCCl cell has already been formed to see that the refloating process goes smoothly. Bank sources hinted that it

Bill Clinton clinches Democratic nomination

LOS ANGELES, June 3: Bill Clinton clinched the Demoentic presidential nomination on Tuesday but polls taken during the final six primaries showed Republicans and Democrats prepared to desert their parties in droves for Texas billionaire Ross Perot, reports Reuter.

Perot, who has no-political party, not a day's experience in office and who entered no primaries, cast a long shadow over the November 3 presidential election as voters expressed disgust with the established parties and their

standard-bearers.

In television network exist polls conducted in the six states that wrapped up the five-month-long presidential primary campaign, between 28 and 46 per cent of voters said they would vote for Perot for president rather than President George Bush or Clinton.
