

Who Will Play Robin Hood?

Everybody's atmosphere: whose responsibility?

As the Earth Summit starts with mixed feelings on the part of its member countries, one of the main issues to be addressed is the relationship between development and the environment. On June 2nd, eve of the summit, the USIS (US Information Service) invited Bangladeshi journalists and representatives of environmental agencies to witness a live Worldnet symposium on UNCED (United Nations Conference on Environment and Development) and issues concerning the future of the world's environment.

But what was really exciting about this satellite programme was that it brought together international participants for an electronic exchange of ideas. During the one hour long programme from 6 pm to 7 pm Dhaka time, panelists from Karachi, Madras and Dhaka posed questions to the two Washington participants, Irwin M Scltzer and Patty Petish. Seltzer is the director of regulatory policy at the American Enterprise Institute in Washington and Petish works for the Overseas Development Council in Washington. The Dhaka panclists were Dr Salehuddin Ahmed programme director of Bangladesh Rural Advancement Committee (BRAC) and Shehabuddin Ahmed, city editor of the Daily Telegraph.

One of the main issues that seemed to preoccupy the panelists was the question of the conflict of interest of rich and poor countries fashionably called North vs South While developing countries (South) emphasise on economic growth, the developed (North) countries are more concerned with environmental degradation. The question is, can these two goals be reconciled since both are vital concerns. Both Seltzer and Petish agreed this was possible. Said Petish, "economic and environmental advantages must be merged and we must stress the positive."

Petish further stressed that investments have to be made on population control in developing countries since the explosion of population has a direct, adverse effect on environment. "We cannot feed people and protect environment at the same time" she said. "So the rich countries have to help the poor countries to control their population growth. If we do not invest in this, all other goals will be undermined."

When asked by the Karachi panelist how population growth would affect the environment in the next few decades Petish maintained that it would be much more difficult for developing countries to carry out poverty alleviation programmes if population continued to grow indiscriminately, said Petish, was responsible for environmental degradation.

Moreover, population growth was the most in what she termed 'fragile areas' such as hillsides, and lands and forests which contributes to the hole in the ozone layer.

To the question (from the Madras panelist) whether the threat of global warning is real Seltzer said philosophically, "there is no regular data on the issue but may be we don't really have to know a lot to acknowledge that a long list of things have to be done. The US will resist fixed targets being set and focus more on procedures. This, I think is more realistic and sensible."

Another persisting question brought forward by the panelists was regarding who should take the blame for environmental degradation. Since countries of the North especially the US were the greatest pollutants of the environment shouldn't they take responsibility? To this Seltzer said that the idea that the polluter should pay was widely accepted and Petish agreed that developed countries should take more responsibility.

In addition Petish proposed expansion of aid to developing countries for economic growth that will lead to sustainable livelihoods. On this Seltzer disagreed saying, "The history of aid shows that no amount of aid can overcome disarray in a country that is centrally directed".

inspite of philosophical and economic differences that are sure to surface in the Summit, both Pctish and Seltzer were optimistic of its outcome. Said Seltzer, "we must abandon addressing issues of income distribution as environmental issues and establish property rights in environmental resources. The conference according to Petish was a positive agenda where good economic measures would be fallen. An important outcome would be a recognition among poor and rich nations, of a common stake. "We are after all, one world", she said.



Appeal to return stolen works of Jainul Abedin

A fervent appeal to 'anonymously' return the 17 stolen works of Jainul Abedin was made, towards the perpetrators of the recent theft, by 16 prominent personalities of the country, including the wife of the late artist, on Wednesday.

In a statement, the signatories expressed deep concern at the theft in Mymensingh last month while terming the stolen works as a 'national treasure.

*As we have not yet heard about any effective steps taken to recover the stolen works," the statement said, adding .*under the circumstances we have been compelled to think that we have something to do about the matter within our limited capabilities."

The thefts appears to have been conducted by a group of people for the sake of adventure' rather than by a group of criminals. "We believe that they are citizens of Bangladesh and they also love the country like any other cit-

izen," the statement said. "Thus, our scrvent appeal towards them - those of you who are involved in this daring theft - is that please do not damage the paintings or hand them over to foreigners," the statement read, adding: "We will arrange for the return of the paintings in such a way that your identities are not disclosed."

The statement went on to request the perpetrators of the theft to contact the Director General of Bangla Academy, Professor Muhammad Harunur-Rashid at telephone number 314429 after 10 pm or contact any one of the signatories.

The 16 signatories also urged the government to 'cautiously take effective steps" to recover the stolen

Abu Sayeed's 'Dhushar Jatra' had its first public screening Wednesday, in front of an in vited audience at the Public Library auditorium. Shot on 16 mm format, the

30-minute long monochrome film was held up for months by the Bangladesh Board of Film Censors which refused permission for its release.

The Censor Board's refusal to release the film led to a public uproar, and an energetic campaign by cultural activists, students, intellectuals and others finally succ eeded in persuading an Appeals Board chaired by Obaidu llah Huq to release it.

During a discussion meet ing chaired by noted drama di rector and critic Sayced Ah med prior to the film's maiden screening, speakers voiced indignation at the Censor Board's attitude towards Dhushar Jatra.

"The Censor Board's decision was a blow against freedom of expression. We cannot have this sort of fascist behaviour when we are claiming to live in a democratic society," renowned poet Shamsur Rahman said in his speech as the chief guest.

The Censor Board had claimed that parts of the film were against the national interest and that they distorted the country's culture.

Other speakers, who included drama actor Abul Khair, veteran journalist Santosh Gupta and Mostafa Monwar, said that it wasn't the film which was objectionable, but rather it was the attitude of the Censor Board.

During the discussions, Abu Sayeed said he, like other short-film makers, had to endure a great deal of difficulties even before the action of the

Oli Ahmed chairs ESCAP meet

Communications Minister Oli Ahmed has been elected chatrperson of the plenary session of the second Asian and Pacific ministerial level meeting on transport and communications, reports BSS. The ESCAP-meeting began

in Bangkok Wednesday Earlier, Oli Ahmed, in his inaugural address, said soon after the installation of the new government in Bangladesh, the country had to tackle many problems created during the last nine years by the autocratic regime. He said we had to face the aftermath of the worst ever cyclone that hit the coastal areas including the off-shore islands within almost one month of the tak ing over.

Oli Ahmed said Bangladesh considers that development of road communication had a tremendous impact on the country's economic development process. Feeder and road networks are considered to be of paramount importance for the purpose, he said, though Bangladesh has 9000 km of paved roads as against 600 km in 1947, the country has for every 100 square km area a more 7.45 km of paved roads as against 16.76 km in the developing countries of the South-East Asia The minister said for a

number of natural impediments like periodic floods and intense rainfall during monsoon, road construction in Bangladesh was very costly and time-consuming, particularly as major investment had to incur on culverts because of the geographical condition of the Bangladesh, he said, liked

to be benefited from transfer of technology evolved by international bodies as well as countries carrying out necessary research activities aimed at reducing construction cost.
