

WASHINGTON, June 6: ILO's " World Labour Report" gives India a mixed review showing a reduction in its poverty rate but expressing concern over growing child labour, reports PTI.

Poverty rate has gone down due to some good economic, social and labour politics of government, but "among the most exploited children are those enslaved in bonded labour - of whom there are several million in South Asia.

In India, special programmes targeting the rural poor, such as the Integrated Rural Development Programme which offered credit and subsidies to start up rural industries, " have also made a contribution.

Asia has one of the highest numbers of child labourers, amounting to 11 per cent of the total labour force in some of its countries. "India probably has the largest number - an estimated 44 million," the latest ILO report says.

Carpet weaving industry alone employs around 3,00,000 children. Nimble fingers, keen eyesight and concentration are the reasons for their large scale employment.

Fifteen per cent workers in match and firewood industries in Sivakasi, the second largest employer of children, in India are aged under 15 years.

Non-formal education for working children may be a solution. In India, for example, a scheme run by the Indian Institute of Education for Working Children in Maharastra teaches different subjects linking it to children's daily needs. It has only 25 per cent drop out rate.

"Green Market" struggle

SAO PAULO (Brazil), June 6: A struggle is in the works for dominance of what may be the next great international growth market - environmental goods and services, writes Reuter.

As heads of state hammer out ground-braking accords at the Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro, the companies and nations involved in the "Green market" struggle are massing in Sao Paulo for Eco-Brasil-92. a major trade exhibition devoted to the latest in environmental products and processes.

The fight pits the world's three leading economic powers - the United States, Japan and Germany - against each other in a battle for control over a market with the potential strategic importance of automobiles, acrospace or com puters, experts say.

Thieves don't lag behind

Reuter from Rio reports: Thieves made off with five km of copper telephone wire connecting phone lines to a small hotel housing dozens of journalists covering the Earth Summit, local telephone comparry officials said.

The theft of the lines, installed last week at the hotel two km from the stte of the

summit, apparently took place under the noses of armed troops and tanks who have fined the road front of the hotel for the last several days.

Dollar damage

Another Reuter despatch adds: The flood of foreign visitors to Brazil - and dollar they are carrying in their pockets are causing blips and hiccups in Brazil's 20 per cent-plus per month inflation and volatile exchange rates.

On the one hand the rush of dollar has kept the cruzeiro per-dollar rate on the black market unusually stable. On the other hand, prices at Rio Centro, the site of the confer-

ence have jumped by 25 per cent in the last few days.
