doctor, artist and scientist — became the rallying figure of those who cried for reforms, then independence. Rizal's incendiary novels, *Noli Me Tangere* and *El Filibusterismo*, forcefully criticized conditions in the colony during the 1880s. Though Rizal personally favored peaceful reforms, he became the first martyr of the nationalist revolution led by the proletarian firebrand Andres Bonifacio and his secret society, the Katipunan.

Rizal was executed at Luneta Park in Manila on December 30, 1876. Under the leadership of Bonifacio, and later, Emilio Aguinaldo, the Katipunan waged a fierce Guerilla war against the Spaniards. But outside forces were to intervene. War between the United States and Spain over Cuba led to the Treaty of Paris of December

1898, which ceded the Philippines to the Americans for twenty million pesos.

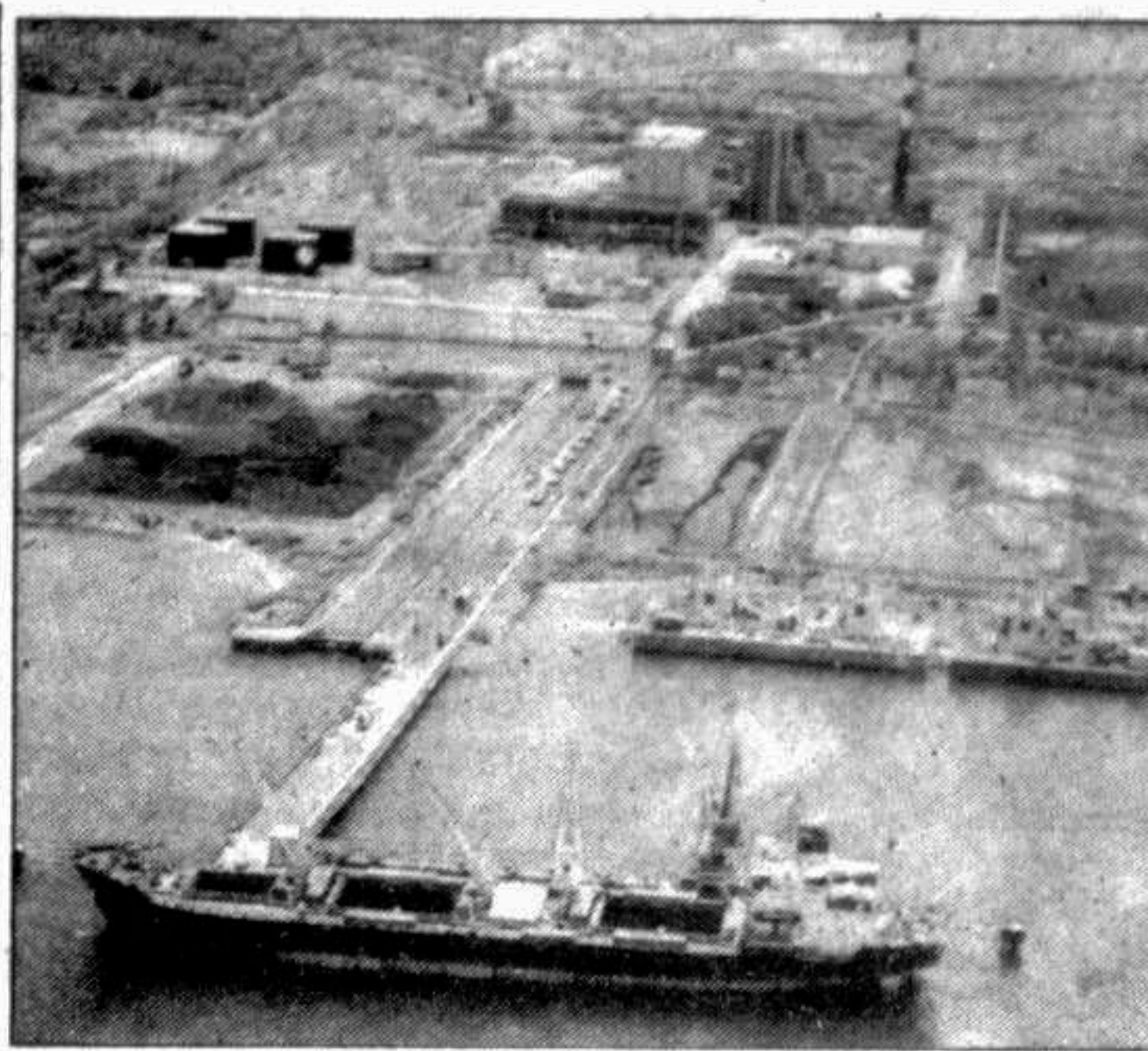
General Aguinaldo, by this time the undisputed leader of the Filipino forces, allied with the Americans to overthrow the Spanish regime. This alliance, concluded while Aguinaldo was in exile in Hongkong, ironically paved the way for American domination of the archipelago. Aguinaldo proclaimed the first republic in Cavite on June 12, 1898. A liberal constitution was ratified in September of the following year at Malolos, designated capital of the new Republic. It was the first republic in Asia, and the revolution that brought it about was the first successful uprising against foreign domination in this part of the world.

War soon broke out between the former allies. After the capture of Aguinaldo in March 1901, the Republic's cause was

carried on by guerilla generals for another six years. The Americans ruled the Philippines for six more years. Their rule was marked by the effective introduction of public education throughout the archipelago. Politically, it was characterized by self-government vested in the Philippine Commonwealth.

The Second World War saw the Philippines in ruins but saw also the birth of true democracy which was temporarily stunted under the Marcos regime but reborn stronger during the incumbency of H. E. President Corazon C. Aquino, after ex-President Ferdinand E. Marcos was toppled by a People Power Revolution in 1986.

The Philippines now looks and moves with more confidence especially after the recently concluded national elections on 11 May 1992.
