Bush, Yeltsin announce surprise arms cuts

WASHINGTON, June 17: US President George Bush and Russian President Boris Yeltsin agreed on Tuesday unexpectedly to make deep new cuts in long-range nuclear warheads and pledged to unravel the mystery of American prisoners of war in Soviet labour camps, reports Reuter. "With this agreement, the

nuclear nightmare recedes more and more for ourselves, our children and our grandchildren," Bush said in a statement he read in the Rose Garden with Yeltsin at his side.

Bush and Yeltsin moved quickly to slash their cold war weapons on the first day of the first US-Russian summit. They agreed that each side could keep between 3,000 and 3,500 warheads for long-range nuclear missiles - far deeper than the 4,700 Washington had proposed as a ceiling.
