Thais shock ROK Bangladesh third among three

Sports Reporter Bangladesh went down fighting to Thailand by a solitary goal in the last match of the Group Five qualifying meet for the tenth Asian Cup cham pionship in Bangkok yesterday.

According to a telephone message received by the Bangladesh Football Federation last night the Thais, who scored a shock 2-1 win against run-away favourites South Korea on Sunday, emerged as the group champions with a controversial goal two minutes from time.

Thailand will now play in the finals of the tenth Asian Cup to be held in Hiroshima, Japan from October 29 to November.

An earlier AFP report from Bangkok said: Thailand defeated South Korea 2-1 after drawing 1-1 half-time in the second match of the 10th Asian Cup football Group 5 qualifying round tournament here Sunday.

Thailand scored first from a penalty taken by Atthapol Buspakom in the third minute but Roe Sang-Rae equalised in the 24th minute with a shot inside the area.

The home side fought back on the wet and slippery rainsoaked ground, but it was not until the 84th minute that they were able to clinch the match after Praseri Changmoon picked up a pass from Piyapong Piew on the left and fired off a superb curving shot from 12 yards (metres) out.

Wagar advised to quit county cricket

LONDON. June 23 Pakistan pace ace Wagar Younis has been ordered by team manager Intikhab Alam to quit English county cricket with Surrey or risk a premature end to his stunning Test career, reports AFP.

Alam, who used to play for Surrey, is concerned that the 20-year-old could suffer a recurrence of his back trouble if he continues playing for them. "Waqar must choose be-

tween a top-class Test career and his commitments with Surrey," Alam told Sunday's People newspaper.

"He suffered a serious stress fracture in his back last winter after bowling nearly 600 overs

for Surrey. "It would be very unwise for him to risk further aggravating that injury by being over-

bowled on county cricket. "My preference would be for him to play in domestic Pakistan cricket and Test

matches only. Surrey coach Geoff Arnold reacted with horror at the possibility of losing Younis, who captured 113 wickets last season. "It would be a devastat-

ing blow if he left us," said the

former England seamer. Younis has already taken 79 wickets in 16 tests.

England fined for slow over rate

LONDON, June 23: England's disappointment at narrowly losing the second Test against Pakistan here on Sunday increased on Monday when they were fined 330 pounds per man for their slow over-rate, reports AFP.

The penalty, which amounts to 15 per cent of the England players' match fee, was imposed by referee Bob Cowper, the former Australian Test batsman.

The fining system, set out in the International Cricket Council's new code of conduct allows the referee to impose a financial penalty of five per

cent for every over short. But he can take into account unusual circumstances and Cowper has calculated that only three overs were down to

England's slowness. The Australian's report cites three mitigating factors - the long walk from the dressing-room to the pitch at Lord's, time lost through moving sightscreens and the tense

Pakistan's victory was only their sixth in 49 Tests against England but their second at Lord's following a win in 1982. However, Pakistan have won


their last three Test series against England who, despite the narrow margin of their defeat in the second Test, may feel the need to assess more critically the composition of their side.

Cricketers return

The victorious Bangladesh cricket team returned from Singapore on Monday, June 22 after having won the South East Asian cricket tournament for the third time in a row.

Holders Bangladesh, who won the first two tournaments held in 1986 and 1989 in Dhaka and Hong Kong respec tively, retained the title by outclassing Hong Kong by six wickets in the final of the fournation meet held from June 15 to 21 in Singapore.

Bangladesh began their campaign by beating Hong Kong by seven wickets. Bangladesh beat Malaysia by seven wickets and entered the final with another facile five-wicket victory over hosts Singapore.

In an anticlimatic and to tally one-sided final Bangla desh humbled Hong Kong by six wickets to retain the title. Bangladesh, however, could not be given the official trophy as the memento was not taken to Singapore from Bangladesh by the defending champions. Aminul Islam Bulbul, Saiful

Islam, Jahangir Talukdar Dulu, Farouge Ahmed, Enamul Hug Mont and to some extent, Akram Khan delivered the goods while Athar Ali Khan, skipper Minhazul Abedin Nannu and vice captain Golam Nawsher Prince did not meet with much success in the week-long tournament.

In-form batsman, Mahbubur Rahman Seltm who scored a sparkling 70 in a warm-up match was one of the few un lucky players who could not play a single match of the tournament.

Saiful Islam, the young GMCC paceman, worked up lively pace and had most of the batsmen groping in the tournament comprising Associate Members of the International Cricket Council (ICC).

The triumph of the successstarved Bangladesh cricket team, however, bears no real significance, apart from an official right to participate in the Asia Cup in Pakistan next October. But the future of that tourney is in doubt following India's refusal to take part.

Tykes to extend Tendulkar's stay

LEEDS, England, June 23 Indian Test prodigy Sachin Tendulkar is set to be offered a tong-term contract by Yorkshire shortly, despite failing to score a century for the English county so far this scason, reports AFP.

The teenager is currently on a one-season deal, but the country's committee are to discuss extending the stay of their first overseas and coloured player because of his success off the field, where he has attracted 1,500 new mem-

"Signing Sachin has been all for the good," Yorkshire Secretary Chris Hassell told Sunday's People newspaper.

"I've had just half a dozen letters from members angry enough to quit because we've broken the old rule that said only Yorkshire lads could play for the county.

"Tendulkar has been so much the right man that the committee will shortly debate a long-term contract to replace his present deal for this summer.

"Even the Yobs who gave the club a bad name by jeering at Viv Richards, Sylvester Clarke and Syd Lawrence have been silenced. "We've not had a word of racial abuse."




