The General Secretary (GS) of Dhaka Polytechnic Institute Central Students' Union was shot dead early Wednesday.

The victim, Shakil Mahmud 21, was a second year student of the electrical department of the institute and Convenor of the Dhaka Polytechnic Institute unit of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD).

On an information over telephone, police rushed to the spot and recovered the bullet-ridden body of the GS at room no-309 at Latif Chhatrabas (west) of the Institute at around 6:30 am Wednesday.

Several students of the hostel said that they heard two or three gunshots at around 3 am

in the early morning they found their GS dead in the room and informed police, Hostel Super and their teachers immediately. A police officer said, when


