England cricket selectors named former captain David Gower to a 13-

man squad Saturday for the third Test against Pakistan starting July 2, dropping allrounder lan Botham and batsman Allan Lamb, reports AP.

Mike Atherton also return to the squad, marking major changes to the top order batting after the narrow second Test defeat at Lord's last week. Gower last played for

England in his 114th Test against Australia in Perth 16 months ago. He needs just 34 runs to break Geoff Boycott's record England aggregate of 8,114 runs.

He was widely assumed to have been dropped for good after captain Graham Gooch was severely critical in a book published earlier this year. Although Gooch also praised

Gower's play, he said he felt more comfortable without Gower in the Test side.

Gower has an average of 66 from the English first-class season so far, and plays for Hamsphire against Pakistan in a three-day match starting Saturday.

Atherton missed England's tour of New Zealand with a

back injury, but has also played well in the English domestic season to win the number three spot from Graeme Hick. who has failed to impress in either the one-day or Test matches.





CAMBRIDGE, England, June 27: Pakistan were kept waiting before completing their expected victory here at Fenner's beating the Combined Universities by nine wickets, Friday, reports AFP.

The tourists' hopes of an early departure to Southampton for their game against championship leaders Hampshire were dashed by stubborn Oxbridge second innings resistance, led by Oxford skipper Geoff Lovell. He scored 96 out of his side's 327.

NEW ORLEANS, June 27: Danny Everett turned super workouts into the second fastest 400 met-

res ever run, 43.81 seconds, as suspended-world record holder Butch Reynolds faded to fifth but still made the American Olympic team at the US Trials on Friday, reports Reuter. Whether Reynolds runs in

Barcelona, however, remained in the hands of US coaches, who may or may not pick him for the US 4X400 metre relay, and officials of the International Amateur Athletic Federation (IAAF), who have said the 1988 Olympic silver medallist will never run in the Olympics because of a 1990 positive steroid test.


The top six finishers in the Trials' 400 metres are considered official members of the US Olympic team and candidates for the US 4X400 metre relay team.

But US coaches may pick anyone who makes the US squad for the 4X100 and 4X400 metre relays. So Reynolds, who needed a US Supreme Court ruling to compete in the trials, could make the American team and never run, officials said.

Everett, often a medallist but never a winner in major competition, finally appeared to shake that label with a surge over the final 200 metres that produced a time second only to Reynolds's 1988 world record time of 43.29 seconds.

"I really wasn't surprised by my time," the 1988 Olympic bronze medallist said. I was feeling really good and I have

been having great workouts." That was in sharp contrast to two months ago when an injury to his Achilles' tendon limited his workouts for four weeks and had him concerned about his status for this

highest ever first day score not assisted by an aiding wind.

Britain's Daley Thompson, whose 1984 world record of 8,847 points O'Brien is chasing, held the previous first day record of 4,677 points.

O'Brien won the first three events of the gruelling 10event, two-day competition, dominating the 100 metres, long jump and shot put, before tying for second in the high jump and placing third in the 400 metres.

His shot put of 16.60 metres (54 feet 5-1/2 inches) was a personal best.

Dave Johnson was in fifth place with 4,194 points, but is a strong second day performer. World champion Michael Johnson and former Olympic gold medallist Carl Lewis breezed through the first

round of the 200 metres. Johnson won his race in 20.44 seconds, and Lewis placed a qualifying third in 20.38 seconds in the next preliminary.

Mike Stucle paced qualifying in the men's shot with a put of 21.10 metres (69 feet 2-3/4 inches) and world silver medallist Gail Devers clocked an impressive 12.86 seconds into a stiff head wind in the women's 100-metre hurdles

A highly competitive 3,000 metre steeplechase final went to three-time Olympian Brian Diemer, who clocked eight minutes 16.56 seconds, as the first four finishers were under



WHO says 6 % athletes use drugs

GENEVA, June 27: At least

six per cent of athletes use performance-enhancing drugs, according to the World Health Organisation (WHO), reports Following a limited survey of athletes in Britain, Australia,

Canada, the United States and

Italy, WHO said on Friday that

the use of drugs has spread alarmingly in sports. An average of six per cent of the athletes surveyed used either steroids, or some other form of illegal stimulants over the previous year, while between six per cent and 20 per cent admitted drug use at

some time.

The statistics excluded figures for alcóhol or smoking. Apart from the danger of disqualification, athletes were ignorant of the grave health risk from using such substances, the UN body warned.

These included a higher

likelihood of suffering from

liver cancer, heart attacks,

high cholesterol levels, impotency and oedema. "Whether its cocaine or steroids, self-injection or injection of growth hormones, there is no denying that the use of drugs has spread to all levels of sport, threatening the security, health and

longevity of numerous athletes," WHO said. The WHO plans to further research the use of stimulants by athletes, while it also expressed concern over the use of steroid among non-athletes.
