Inside Today 7 One killed, 50 hurt in Adamjee gunbattle

NARAYANGANJ, July 4: A schoolboy was shot dead and over 50 others injured this morning in a triangular gunfight among the activists of ruling BNP, opposition Awami League and Jatiya Party at the Adamjee Jute Mills and its sur-

rounding areas. According to police and witnesses, the trouble originated at the Dhaka Baju Workers' Colony of the AJM at around mid-night Friday for control over the colony which later spread over the areas surrounding the mills.

Selim, a class ten student of Adamjee High School, received bullet in his chest while passing over the Kadamtali Bridge at 8 this morning.

Selim expired on way to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH).

Unconfirmed sources claimed that he was a worker of the AL-backed Chhatra

The trouble was triggered by a group of workers in their bid to usurp the leadership of Siddig Sarder, a Jatiya Partysupported Jatiya Sramik Party leader, witnesses said.

The attackers reportedly belong to the ruling partybacked Jatiyatabadi Sramik

According to AJM sources, the first round of the clash took place between the supporters of BNP and Jatiya Party at about 12 mid night while

the second round of clash occurred between the activists of BNP and AL in the morning.

The clashes that erupted in and around the AJM continued till 9 this morning leaving at least 50 people of the clashing parties injured. They were treated at different hospitals and clinics at Adamjee and Narayanganj as well as at the AJM Medical Centre.

Police reportedly did not take action against the troublemakers nor did they arrest anybody in connection with the incidents.

Armed police were deployed at the trouble spots. The situation prevailing there was termed as explosive by the Sec Page 12 Col 1

Jubo Command attacks CPB office

48 killed as fresh battle grips Kabul

KABUL, July 4: At least 48 persons were killed in Kabul this afternoon as a guerilla faction south of the city traded rocket and artillery fire with government troops garrisoned inside the capital, reports Reuter.

Today's fighting was between the Hezb-i-Islami forces of Gulbuddin Hekmatyar massed to the south of Kabul, and 53rd division forces led by General Rashed Dostum, based at the ancient fortress of Bala

Each side blamed the other for shooting first.

Hezb rockets landed near the bus station adjacent to the Ariana Hotel, killing 32 persons and injuring at least 50 others according to eyewit-

Government troops said ten men were killed and three injured when six Hezb rockets fell on the Kabul garrison.

Reporters saw six bodies. three of them in civilian clothes, lying in pools of blood See Page 12 Col 7

Water talks with Delhi this month

Basking in the success symbolised by the opening of the Tinbigha corridor last week, Dhaka and New Delhi are warming up to work on the other outstanding issues including water sharing.


