The first page shows Barcelona on an otherwise blank map and asks: "In which country would you place this point?"

The answer on the next page is "In Catalonia, of course," described as "A country in Spain with its own cul ture, language and identity. That is the only time the word Spain appears.


Some 12,000 a day will be guests on the boats and the floating hotels will be one of the biggest accommodation complexes in Barcelona during



in Barcelona JOHANNESBURG, July 19: Controversial South African track star Zola Budd-Pieterse may pull out of the Olympics and retire permanently if medical reports of a liver disorder prove correct, according to a newspaper here, reports

The Sunday Star said Budd, allegedly suffering from a liver disorder similar to jaundice which accounted for her poor form in the run-up to the Olympics, was awaiting a second opinion.

Her husband Mike Pieterse was quoted as saying: "Her chances of competing in the Games are no more than 50/50.

SAPPORO, Japan, July 19: Ukrainian Vassily Bubka won an international pole vault competition Sunday but did not approach his elder brother Sergei's world record, reports

In the Nambu Memorial Track and Field Meet, Vassily cleared 5.60 metres (18 feet, 4 1/2 inches) at the Shibettu Park Field, in northern Japan. Sergei's world record is 6.11 metres (20 - 1/2).

American Tim Bright was second, clearing 5.50 metres (18 - 1/2).

Namibian Frankie Fredericks, who outran Michael Johnson and Linford Christie to win the 200 metres at the Golden Gala meet in early June, won the men's 100-meter dash in 10.16 seconds.

China's Wang Chunfang leaped 6.35 metres (20 - 10) and won the women's long jump. American Julie Bright finished third at 6.50 metres (19 - 10 1/4).

Li Huirong of China Jumped 14.55 metres (47 - 8 3/4) for victory in the women's triple jump. American Sheila Hudson was second at 13.96 metres (45 - 9 1/2). Diana Wills Orrange of the United States placed third at 13.11 metres (43 - 1/4).

Jane Holderness-Roddam, chairman of British selectors, said: "We are all very disappointed. However we feel that with the same team as at last year's European Championships we have an equally strong chance of bringing back medals for Britain."

Bowe wins right to challenge Holyfield



LAS VEGAS, July 19: Riddick Bowe carned a shot at heavyweight champion Evander

Holyfield battering Pierre Coetzer into defeat in the seventh round of a match that had a little bit of everything Saturday night, reports AP.

Referee Mills Lance stopped the bout with one second left in the seventh round as the crowd of about 4,000 at The Mirage casinohotel booed lustily. It appeared Bowe hit Coetzer low just before an onslaught of punches that led to the fight being

The scheduled 12-round fight between Coetzer, the No 1-ranked boxer from South Africa, and the No 2 Bowe was a World Boxing Association elimination bout. Bowe will now challenge Holyfield for the undisputed title Nov 13 at Las Vegas.

There were no knockdowns but both fighters threw thunderous punches, with Bowe landing the majority. Coetzer was cut under the right eye, over the left eye, in the corner of the left eye and on the nose, and the left eye was almost closed.


