Sports Reporter An eight-member Bangladesh Olympic contingent left Dhaka for London enroute to Barcelona by British Airways last might, to take part in the 25th Olympics to begin in Barcelona from July 25.

The contingent consisting of four athletes, one swimmer and one shooter and two offictals - team manager Ateegur Rahman and coach Abdul Mannan - was seen off at the Zia International Airport by BOA officials.

Bangladesh will take part in three disciplines - athletics,

swimming and shooting. Chief de mission and State Minister for Youth and Sports Sadeq Hossain will join the team in Barcelona by the end of this month.

The athletic quartet -Golam Ambia, Shahanuddin Chowdhury and Shah Jalal Mobin - will take part in the 4X100m relay race.

As regards the individual event, Golam Ambia, reputed to be the fastest man of the country, will take part in the 100m sprint. Lanky Shahanuddin Chowdhury will compete in the 200m while Mehdi Hassan, who has staged a remarkable comeback following a fracture of his collar bone, will run in the 400m event

Mukhlesur Rahman, the lone swimmer in the squad, will take part in the 100m and 200m breast-stroke events.

Kazi Shahana Parveen, the first Bangladeshi shooter to take part in the Olympics, will contest in the air rifle event.

Meanwhile, Zafar Imam, Deputy Secretary General of the Bangladesh Olympic Assoctation, will leave Dhaka for Barcelona tomorrow.

#### **KL** wins 1998 C'wealth Games

BARCELONA, July 21: Kuala Lumpur will stage the 1998 Commonwealth Games, the Commonwealth Games Federation announced today, reports Reuter.

The Malaysian capital won 40 votes to beat Adelaide, the only other candidate, which collected 25.

Alex Lee, vice-president of the Olympic Council of Malaysia, said delegates had felt it was time for a Third World country to stage the Games.

"The message we drove home was that if we have such a strong bid and Malaysia cannot win then which other Third World country could win and would any other developing country ever bid," he said.

South Australia state premier John Bannon said: "At the end of the day I think the argument that prevailed was that it was time for a developing nation and Kuala Lumpur demonstrated that they had a capacity and that was sufficient for a majority of delegates."

Other delegates were surprised at the margin of victory and said if reflected the bitterness of the row over travel subsidies.

Except for Jamaica in 1966, the Games have been held only in Britain, Canada, Australia and New Zealand.

## Powell flies with the wind

SESTRIERE, Italy, July 21 American world record holder Mike Powell recorded the longest jump in history today with a wind-assisted 8.99 metres at an international athletics meeting here, reports Reuter.


Powell, who broke Bob Beamon's 23-year-old long jump world record with a leap of 8.95 at last year's Tokyo World Championships, came close to breaching the nine-metre mark here with the help of a following wind of three metres a second, a metre above the allowable limit.

Carl Lewis, the world record holder and world champion who did not qualify for the Barcelona Olympic 100 metres, finished first over the distance in 9.97 seconds with a following wind of 2.5 metres a second.

His Santa Monica Track Club team mate Mike Marsh clocked 19.79 in the 200 and former world record holder Renaldo Nehemiah returned 13.29 in the 110 metres hurdles. Both times were windassisted.

About 10,000 spectators were present in the high-altitude ski resort town on a cold and blustery morning.

# Mitchell vows to be a 'hungry lion' at Barcelona



nce, July 21: Dennis Mitchell is acting like a hungry lion waiting to pounce on his unsuspecting prey, reports AP.

Since becoming the king of American sprinters last month by winning the 100-meter championships at the US Olympic trials, Mitchell has failed to assert his authority.

Instead of winning, he has settled for second and third place finishes on the tough European circuit.

The losses will not have any bearing on his Olympic performance, he says.

"They haven't damaged my confidence," he said at the US track and field team's training facility, before leaving for a meet Tuesday night at Sestriere, Italy.

"I cannot win every race I'm in. I cannot do that, I will not dot that. I've always lost. Losing has made me hungry to win. "In Barcelona, I will come

out a hungry animal." Wining the 100 meter gold medal is so important to Mitchell that he might even

skip the 400 meter relay. It's not that he wants to forgo the relay, it's just the confusion and controversy involving it may force him to do

Mitchell reported to the team's training camp, as told, relay teammates, Mark Witherspoon, Leroy Burrell and Mike Marsh, the 2-3-4 finishers at the trails, then running

two races together.

brief practice before Witherspoon, Burrell and Marsh left camp, and will be untested going into Barcelona, a most unusual circumstance. Workouts are scheduled each day from Friday through Monday.

"It's not that critical, not with this group," men's coach Mel Rosen said of the relay team's lack of competition. Mitchell doesn't agree.

"We're going to have to go into Barcelona cold," he said in credulously.

Mitchell also is perturbed that he was not asked to anchor the relay. Instead, he is scheduled to run the third leg, after Witherspoon and Burrell, and before Marsh - if that is the eventual makeup of the team.

"Every Olympic trials champion has anchored the relay," said Tony Campbell, Mitchell's agent and coach.

"Everybody expects me to be the third leg, because I'm such a technician on the turn," Mitchell said. "So I guess I'll do what's best for the team."

Mitchell is hoping these Games turn out better for him than did the 1988 Olympics.

Four years ago, he finished fifth in the 100 and was advanced to fourth, one place out of a medal, after Ben Johnson was disqualified for testing positive for steroids. And he never got to run in the relay final, after the US team was disqualified for passing out of the zone in the first round heats. In the 100 final, Mitchell was unhappy about drawing lane eight.

"I just watched them (the other sprinters) run," he lamented. "I might as well have been a spectator... I didn't start running until about 75

meters." Mitchell had a much better start - an official computer timing device showed he got a "flyer"— at last year's World Championships in Tokyo. He maintained the lead for more than half the race, before being overtaken by Carl Lewis and Burrell, and finishing third in 9.91 seconds, his career

It was the greatest 100 meter race in history, with six runners breaking 10 seconds. including Lewis, who set a world record of 9.86 and

the second-fastest ever. This time, Mitchell does not have to contend with Lewis, the two-time Olympic gold medalist and two-time world champion but sixthplace finisher at the trials, and the race is considered wide

Burrell, the runner-up in 9.88.

In addition to the three Americans, the top contenders include Olapade Adeniken and Davidson Ezinwa of Nigeria, Frank Federicks of Namibia, Linford Christie of Britain, Rymond Stweart of Jamaica and Bruny Surin and the returning Johnson of Canada.

## Death shall have no dominion

MONTREAL, July 21 Sylvie Frechette, a world champion synchronised swimmer and gold-medal contender, is leaving Wednesday to compete in the Olympic Games despite the death of her finance last weekend, her coach said, reports AP.

Sylvain Lake, 26, a former nationally ranked 400-metre runner and a French-language TV sports commentator, died of apparent carbon monoxide poisoning at the couple's home in nearby Laval.

Frechette, 25, returned home from training last Saturday to find Lake dead in the house. A car, its engine idling, was in the closed garage, Julie Sauve, Frechette's coach, said Sunday.

Laval police are still investigating and declined comment on the cause of death pending an autopsy.

Frechette is scheduled to leave for Barcelona on Wednesday with Sauve and teammates Penny Vilagos and Vicky Vilagos, who will represent Canada in Olympic duet competition.

"Sylvie will compete at the Olympics, there is no question of that," said Sauve, Frechette's coach of 18 years.

"She's fine — a not perfect, of course, because she's obviously deeply affected by this."

"But while this is a terribly difficult matter for her to deal with, Sylvie is a very strong person and she is surrounded by family and many friends who care for her. She has trained and competed for 18 years, the last eight for this Olympic Games, and we will support her the best we can," Sauve

Sauve said Frechette called her 10 minutes after the swimmer arrived home. She said Frechette found no note from Lake at the scene and was at a total loss to explain his death.

The couple had tried on several occasions to set a wedding date but postponed plans due to Frechette's training and competition schedule.

Sauve said she and Frechette "understand our responsibility to the public and the press, and Sylvie will make a statement, but we will consult first with her sports psychologist."

BARCELONA, July going gets tough in the Olympic 1,500 metres fre-

estyle, the thoughts of a young world record holder may lightly turn to plentiful pints of beer, reports Reuter.

Kieren Perkins, an 18-yearold Australian, has every chance of becoming swimming's king in Barcelona after shattering world records in three distances this year but he appears to be taking it all in his relaxed stride.

Silver medallist in a magnificent 1,500 metres duel with Germany's Joerg Hoftmann in the 1991 Perth World Championships, Perkins is now the front-runner for the 400 and 1,500 freestyle and will also be dangerous competitor in the 200 and 4X200 freestyle relay. Number one priority re-

mains the 1,500, longest race in Barcelona's Bernat Picornell Olympic pool. It will last the best part of 15 minutes for Perkins and much more for most others. "I think about how many
