Taking the floor next, Fazlur Rahman Patal, State Minister for Communications and a BNP leader, said that it was painful for the Treasury bench that the JP leader was trying to teach it democratic behaviour.

It was not only BNP but also the suffering masses of the country that had termed the Ershad regime autocratic' the BNP leader said adding 'the JP leadership should also beg pardon for the misdeeds it committed against the people during nine years of its rule.'

Referring to the speech of Mohammad Nasim of the AL in Parliament the day before, the Minister said that the BNP strongly believed that it had not come to day in power forever. He further said that the opposition must not forget that it was the BNP that rescued the country from the one-party autocratic rule by introducing multi-party democracy. Again it was the BNP that switched over to a parliamentary democracy from the presidential one introduced by the AL.

The BNP leader admitted that the law and order had deteriorated, but that there were deliberate efforts to tarnish the image of the democratically elected government by encouraging terrorism.

Referring to the Nirmul Committee movement led by Jahanara Imam, the BNP minister said, 'being a freedom fighter I really understand Mrs Imam's state of mind caused by the loss of the life of her son in the Liberation War.'

'But it surprises me why this respectable mother was silent during the last 20 years,' Fazlur Rahman said adding, 'She has started demanding trial of Golam Azam only to embarrass the democratic government.'

The Minister however told the House that the government would implement any verdict of the Court on Golam Azam within six hours of the time it was passed.

BSS adds: Participating in the discussion Sajeda Chowdhury, General Secretary of the AL, said that no democratic government had any right to cling to power if it failed to protect the lives and property of the people and build up a system of accountability of its actions.

She said that as in the past, her party would continue to uphold the interest of the commonman. 'We will extend support to pro-people steps of the government, but will oppose its anti-people role,' she said.

In this context, she demanded repeal of the Special Powers Act and the Indemnity Ordinance. She also demanded autonomy to radio and television to uphold the Declaration of the three alliances.

The AL member was highly critical of what she described 'politicisation of the administration and patronisation of terrorism' by the government and said that such anti-democratic behaviour not only exposed government's 'wantonness', but also affected the flourishing of democracy.

She expressed concern at the 'unholy alliance' of the BNP and the Jamaat in a move to curtail pro-independence forces and expressed apprehension that such moves might push the nation toward a civil war.

Earlier, BSS adds, initiating budget discussion, Treasury Bench member from Tangail Khondakar Abu Taher thanked the Finance Minister for presenting a pragmatic budget in the House.

However, he criticised the proposal for reduction of duty and tax on diesel car and parts, saying this measure was 'suicidal'. He also criticised Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation terming it as a 'white elephant'.

Speaking next, M Mizanur Rahman Manu (AL-Dinajpur) said this year's budget lacks political commitment. The budget does not give any direction for solving the problems of the toiling masses, he said.

Manu urged the government to make the Dinajpur government college into a university college.

Khondakar Amirul Islam (Hira Mia) of the Treasury Bench from Mymensingh urged the opposition members not to oppose the budget merely for the sake of opposition. Hira Mia also called upon the government to make Mymensingh a division.

Moulana M Sakhawat Hossain (Jamaat-Jessore) said discussion on the budget after the passage of the finance bill was nothing but mere formalities.

He observed that this 'bureaucratic budget' would have no positive impact on the country's economy.

Dr AKM Kamaruzzaman (BNP-Comilla) urged the government to set up more mental hospitals in the country. He also called for more employment of the doctors.

He urged the government for setting up an Agricultural University in Comilla.

Treasury Bench member Saiful Azam said the Finance Minister had placed the best and most pragmatic budget this year since after independence. He urged all the members of the house to cooperate with the government in implementing the budgetary proposals in the greater interest of the nation.

Azam said 'A very small but very powerful group of bureaucrats' was trying to obstruct the smooth implementation of the national budget. He urged the government to identify those 'harmful' few bureaucrats for the sake of the welfare of the people of the country.

Awami League member Sheikh Harunur Rashid criticized the budget and said it was tailored to suit the interest of the industrialists and affluent people at the advice of the World Bank and International Monetary Fund. He demanded still higher allocations in the agriculture and education sectors.

Participating in the budget discussion, Treasury Bench member Mrs Bani Ashraf lauded the various measures taken in the national budget and said this most pro-people, welfare-oriented and pragmatic budget would lead the country on to the path of prosperity, progress and development.

Colonel (Retd) Shwakt Ali (AL-Shariatpur) said the Finance Minister appeared more keen for macro economy but he wondered how such an economy was possible without developing micro economy.

He called for development of the micro economy for eventual approach to macro economy as a realistic basis of the state of economy for a country like ours.

Awami League member Sharifuddin Ahmed took the floor to participate in the budget discussion as the house resumed its afternoon sitting at 3.22 with Speaker Shaikh Razaque Ali in the chair.

Ahmed alleged that the budget was framed under the directives of the donor countries.

Syed Ohidul Alam of the Treasury Bench said the socio-economic condition of the country was truly reflected in the proposed budget. The budget gives a correct guideline for optimum use of the foreign aid, he said.

Awami League member Mesbahuddin Khan urged the Finance Minister for taking measures to encourage export. He alleged that no provision was made in the budget for ameliorating the lot of the common people. He demanded publication of the list of the persons who got loan exemption.

8 last year under the provisions of Article 233 of the Rules of Procedure. This is one of the highest Committees having constitutional sanction.

Headed by LK Siddiqui and comprising 14 other members, the Committee submitted its first report to the House in February. In its second report the Committee observed that in most cases the statements of expenditures by departments differed with actual expenditures. In addition, the respective ministries quite often, failed to surrender the unspent money and did not regularise the extra spending by reallocating those in the supplementary budget. This led to indiscipline in public spending, the committee observed.

The Committee further observed that the present audit system was not adequate to take the load created by huge development expenditure in the public sector since the independence of the country.

There was, according to the report of the Committee, no scope to have a complete evaluation of public spending under the existing traditional auditing system. The Committee felt that a comprehensive auditing system should be introduced.

To prepare the second report, the Committee reviewed the performances of the Ministry of Food, Ministry of Communications (Rly), Ministry of Defence (Cantonment Boards), Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Ministry of Shipping (Chittagong Port Authority and BIWTC).

Reviewing the performances of the Railway, the Committee felt that losses suffered by this organization was having a crippling effect and suggested physical verification and evaluation of the existing situation to find solutions. The Committee reports says that in the absence of a check and balance system, the Railway Division goes on spending without any consideration for budget allocation. Besides, the Bangladesh Bank cannot dishonour any cheque of the Railway Division because of a system called 'freedom' given to some department since long.

Referring to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs the Committee observed that there was a lack of initiative in settling the audit objections raised about expenses incurred by our missions abroad. The Committee also observed that in missions abroad the exchange rate was not followed and, in some cases, more money as salary and allowances was given than what was mentioned in the pay-slip.

The Committee further observed that in most cases the Ministry of Foreign Affairs did not take adequate measures to recover the money drawn in an irregular way.

For recovering the cost of repatriation, the Committee has suggested joint efforts by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Ministry of Home Affairs.

2 chopped to death in Barguna

BARGUNA, July 22: Two people were chopped to death near their home in village Gabtali of Betagi thana in Barguna district yesterday. They were kidnapped on Monday night, family sources said, reports UNB.

The bodies of Sohera Begum (50) and Kahu Miah (60) were recovered from near their house. Sohera was the wife of Rajab Ali, an alleged terrorist of the area, while Kahu Miah was Rajab's brother.

The kidnappers, members of another terrorist group headed by Kanchan, attacked the house of Rajab Ali on Monday night and killed one person, injured another and took two others with them.

Accord with Pak team to boost private sector trade

Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI) and Federation of Pakistan Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FPCCI) yesterday signed an agreement on economic and commercial cooperation to foster mutually beneficial relationship among the private sectors of the two countries, reports BSS.

The agreement, the second such between the apex bodies of private sectors of Bangladesh and Pakistan, in reality is the renewal of the first one signed here in 1984. The five-year long first agreement expired in 1989.

Mahbubur Rahman, President, FBCCI, and Mian Habib Ullah, President, FPCCI staged the agreement at FBCCI Bhawan in presence of leading businessmen and members of Pakistani trade delegation. SH Khilji, Commercial Secretary of the Pakistan Embassy was also present.

The signing came on the concluding day of the five-day visit of 19-member FPCCI delegation. During their stay here, besides holding discussions with their counterparts, the delegation visited Chittagong and met a number of ministers.

While recognising the long historic relations and immense possibilities of improving economic and commercial ties between the two countries, the two sides were of the view that economic and trade relations have to be forged within the framework of the law and regulations of both the countries.

Before signing the accord, Mahbubur Rahman renewed FBCCI's pledge and determination to fulfill the obligation stated in the agreement and also to work for mutual benefit. The agreement would act as an 'instrument' for both the federation to march ahead.

tre road from Ullapara to Paksey through Nagarbari, Pabna and Dashuria on the one hand and from Peerganj to Rangpur on the other was scheduled to take off by winter, they said.

For a quick completion of the project, work order would be awarded under eight components, the officials added.

The bidding, on the basis of pre-qualifications of local and international firms, was complete and the authorities were evaluating the bids, they said.

The officials informed that a World Bank team would be in Dhaka early next month for pre-appraisal of a similar project in the region.

The planned project was for the development of a 200-kilometre road running through Dashuria, Natore, Rajshahi and Chapainawabganj on the one hand and Syedpur, Beladanga on the other. The World Bank is likely to finance the project.

Meanwhile, a pre-implementation review is underway to construct a 55-kilometre road from Nalka to Banpara through Hatikamul bisecting Chalan Bil, as part of the master plan conceived in the backdrop of the Jamuna Bridge construction, the Ministry officials said.

Under the plan, they said, a 136-kilometre road connecting Ullapara of Pabna and Syedpur of Rangpur had already been developed and renovated.

came back to the country in July 1978. Such temporary absence cannot disqualify a person from being a citizen of the country, the defence lawyer argued citing a judgement of the High Court.

Physically, Golam Azam was not present for some years in the country, but legally he was present, Barrister Yusuf argued.

He stressed that the petitioner had always intended to continue to be a citizen of Bangladesh, saying 'intention is a paramount factor for citizenship.'

Citing a judgement of an English judge, Yusuf said a person can be resident of two places at time — physically at one place and legally at the other.

Referring to inclusion of the name of the petitioner in the voters' lists of the two occasions, the defence lawyer said Election Commission is an independent body and till publishing of the final voters' list, none raised any objection to the inclusion of his name there.

He argued that according to the first clause of the Article 122 of the constitution, a voter must be a citizen of the country.

Much of what they said could not be heard as the non-BJP members and BJP members were involved in heated exchanges, with the ruling party members also joining the fracas occasionally.

several-minute submission by Barrister Amirul Islam who moved the bail petition at around 12:40 pm.

Islam said that the Jamaat, ICS, Freedom Party and so called Jubo Command hired people from different districts who could not identify each other during the incident.

The Court Inspector read the charge petition.

Several hundred people thronged the court to hear the proceedings and later chanted slogans outside the courtroom following the decision.

Medical College Hospital (DMCI) and his condition was said to be critical.

Mostaq who escaped the attack told The Daily Star, the killers were four in number and all were equipped with 'kata-rifles'. The killers barricaded the road with an ash-coloured Toyota Publica car and then opened fire without saying anything.

Mostaq further said, his employer—Mona also tried to shoot with his revolver but failed as the killers' shots first pierced Mona's body.

'I only heard my master saying 'what are you doing' as if he could recognize the killers', said Mostaq.

When asked, Mostaq further told, he was appointed Mona's driver two years ago but never saw any of the killers before.

Mona's business partner Ebadullah told The Daily Star, when Mona started for the bank to deposit the daily turnover, he was at the office.

Ebadullah further said, it seemed to be a pre-planned

murder. 'It was not a murder for snatching the money', he added.

Mona's relatives said, Mona had no feud with anyone and had never ever been threatened with murder.

Meanwhile, the autopsy of the body was done at the Forensic Department of the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCI) and then brought to his residence at Agamasi Lane where hundreds of people rushed to pay him the last visit.
