



After the first of two rain interruptions, which cost a total of 80 minutes' play, Mallender then bowled Astf Mujtaba off an inside edge to start a dramatic Pakistan decline.

Like Mujtaba, Raja prodded tentatively at a Pringle ball just short of a length and got an inside edge on to his stumps through the gap between bat and pad.

LONDON, July 24: South African-born England batsman Allan Lamb became the first player from Northamptionshire to hit a double century and a century in one match in their English county championship clash with Warwickshire on Thursday, reports Reuter.

Skipper Lamb became only the 16th player in championship history to achieve the feat when he hit 107 off 103

The Summer Olympic Games, the greatest global gathering of spo-

Ever since Pierre de Coubertin, the father of the Modern Olympics restarted the quadrennial ancient, Attic practice in 1896 sportsmen and sports-lovers all over the world have been taking daemonic interest in this sporting meet parexcellence often dubbed as The Greatest Show on Earth. The splendour and size of this international assembly changes invariably for the better, for the more, but never the

spectacle. Although the leitmotif of the Olympics is participation, not just the materialistic business of losing and winning, the equation of effort and achievement is too inveterate in the human psyche to be

blacked out for long. In the annals of the Modern Olympics since 1896, the United States of America tops the list as the biggest collector of medals with 1802. Three countries - Great Britain, France, and Australia - however, share the honour of highest number of participations, each taking part on 22

occasions. Greece, the place from where the religio loci of the Olympics arises, have also taken part in 22 Olympiads. Their medal tally, however, is not so impressive with only 101 medals coming along in the course of 92 years.

South Korea, the only Asian hosts of the Olympics in 1988 have managed 70 medals from ten appearances.

However, Japan leads the Asian countries by far, notching 244 medals from 15 participations. China has sixty Sports Reporter

from six appearances. Extled for 32 years for their policy of racial discrimination, South Africa till the time of their return in the present 25th Olympics in Spain, have collected 52 medals from 13

participations. The Baltic State, Estonia and Latvia, recently regaining their freedom from the Soviet Union, had participated in the Olympics five and four times before being coerced into the Union. Estonia have a healthy collection of 21 medals while Latvia only four.

Arch-rivals and subcontinental neighbours india and Pakistan do not have encouraging Olympiad records. India, from 17 appearances, got 14 medals while Pakistan nine from ten.



BARCELONA, July 24: Eleven brief months ago the world was at their feet. Now they are mere

show on earth, reports Reuter. It is a long way from the victory podium in Tokyo to the starting line at the Barcelona Olympics as Carl Lewis, Katrin Krabbe, Dan O'Brien and many more have discovered.

Doping scandals, injuries and selection problems have prevented some of the biggest names in athletics, including those who were crowned world champions in Japan only last August, from going for glory again in Spain.

Of the 20 men who won individual gold medals in men's track and field in Tokyo, no less than nine have failed to make it on to sport's most prestigious stage.

Five of them were wiped out at one stroke by the controversial selection procedure used by the United States

Most countries would have rolled out a mile of red carpet to acquire Lewis' services. Six Olympic gold medals, seven world titles and an astonishing world record in Tokyo in the greatest sprint ever run are the kind of references no other athlete has ever been able to offer.

But at the US trials in New Orleans, Lewis' past counted for nothing when he lined up as just another John Doe needing to finish in the first three to get an Olympic berth.

Bothered by sinus troubles, the winner of the last two Olympic 100 meters titles came in only sixth and missed the boat.

Lewis at least qualified in the long jump to give himself a place in the team, unlike triple jump world champion Kenny Harrison, high hurdles gold medallist Greg Foster, 400 meters runner Antonio Epettigrew and the man hailed as the best all-round athlete of his age, Dan O'Brien.

The world decathlon champion fluffed the pole vault completely when he failed to clear his opening height of 4.80 meters, a level he takes daily in practice with no prob-

Ironically, a vault of a more three meters would have taken him to Barcelona where he would probably have been the hottest favourite for a gold medal in any event.


