

Two-tier system for local govt suggested

The Local Government Commission Sunday presented its report to Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia recom mending a two-tier system for local administration, reports

The Commission, formed on November 24, had 18 meetings before finalising the report on July 30.

Prime Minister thanked the Commission and said its recommendations will be con-

sidered by the government. She hoped that the report will help formulate a comprehensive guideline for the local government.

Explaining the salient features of the report, Information Minister and Chairman of the Commission Barrister Nazmul Huda said the report fulfilled the constitutional pledge of the democratic government to make the administration more transparent.

He said the two-tier system union and district council will strengthen the democratic process as all members at both levels would be elected representatives.

The down-to-top planning system would ensure people's participation in the development programmes of the government. A better coordination would be possible under the system which would ensure more check and balance. Barrister Huda said.

BSS adds: The Information Minister said it would comprise union parishad at village level and zila parishad to district level. There will also be a gram sabha with 10 elected members from each village, he said adding the union parishads would remain accountable to gram sabhas.

The 17-member commission prepared the report in cight months time. Members of the commission attended the presentation ceremony. Dhaka plans simple but impressive ceremonies for the seventh SAARC summit it will host in the second week of December.

The summit, an annual event of the seven-nation South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC), has returned to Dhaka a year earlier, as Bhutan, the scheduled host for the seventh conference, passed it over citing lack of facilities.

Launched in Dhaka in 1985, the SAARC has brought together Bangladesh, India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Nepal, Bhutan and the Maldives for the uplift of the region's one billion peo-

Preparations for the Dec. 12-14 summit have got underway with the government approving a Tk eight-crore budget, setting up ministerial level committees, a preparatory committee headed by former Foreign Secretary Farug Ahmed Chowdhury and a summit cell of officials.

'Azam absconded abroad on politico-military mission' Magistrate of Brahmanbaria or

Golam Azam was asked by the government through a gazette notification to appear before a court before he had been disqualified to be a citizen of Bangladesh, but he absconded abroad on "a politicomilitary mission", reports

This was stated by Attorney General Aminul Hug in the High Court yesterday, refuting defence lawyer's contention that the Jamaat leader had 'never been given any notice to explain his position before his disqualification. "It's not true that Golam Azam has never been asked to appear before any authority of Bangladesh, rather he remained absconded," the government pleader said on the 11th day of hearing of a writ petition in Golam Azam's citizenship case before a High Court division bench.

The attorney read out the gazette notification of February 9, 1972 published on February 15 which asked Azam to appear before the Subdivisional
