Mohammed Salauddin, 55 years old vendor, operates from Dhanmandi. All is well with him. This is, despite the fact that what he revealed about the city security, at certain quarters, might not please them. Even if RAJUK might not be amused by his existence in a residential area, he is certainly doing a fair measure of service to the rickshaw-pullers, gate-keepers, servants, teen-agers and men and even women in his vicinity.

Salauddin has had to struggle for at least 30 years, before he could reach the position that he has risen to - a small entrepreneur, with a working wife, married daughters, and an active, able-bodied son, with a reasonable job. Three of his daughters have been married, and there is only the youngest, aged 14 years - who stays at home - to be concerned with.

Yes, he has his ambitions to own a larger shop; but if he so desires it, one fears he will have to pack up and set up shop else-where.

This is because his immediate neighbours are not quite satisfied with his tinshop's existence. Yet class-distinctions will prevail and will ultimately be overcome. Such is peace-loving onlooker's observation. Where he is located, he gets his food and shelter, has his occupation, and even catches fishes at his three-roomed house in Raibazar, as he tells

do not waste time in gossip or tattle. but tranquilize myself by watching the world go by on the wide road before me. I meet my wife

twice a day, and I am glad that I no longer have to work my heart out - pushing carts, paddling rickshaws in the rain and heat, or take up odd jobs, like being a mason's assistant. I am weary but I have scored my innings for my age, and the rest is up to God", he says, when questioned about his likes and dislikes of his steady flow of tea.


being a farmer's son, with no hassle of filial visits to the parental home, as both the parents




