Govt, opposition yet to reach accord

The ruling party and the charges brought against the opposition met yesterday to fix the duration of discussion in parliament on the no-confidence motion but were learnt to have failed to reach an understanding, reports UNB.

Speaker Shaikh Razzaque Ali called meeting of the Business Advisory Committee of Jatiya Sangsad yesterday morning mainly to discuss and determine the length of debate on the no-confidence motion against the government, scheduled for August 12.

Sources close to the meeting said BNP proposed 12 hours of discussion and suggested it to be completed the same day, August 12.

But the representatives from the opposition parties and groups at the meeting pleaded for at least 20 hours of deliberation spreading over two days.

Deputy Leader of the Opposition Abdus Samad Azad told that the opposition should be given adequate time to discuss the situation prevailing in the country and prove the nine
