BELGRADE, Aug 23: Heavy shelfing overnight in Sarajevo killed five people and wounded nine others, radio Sarajevo reported, while Muslim forces were reported to be continu ing attacks on Serbian positions around the city, reports

Afghan groups asked to shift offices from Pakistan

ISLAMABAD, Aug 23: The Pakistan government has asked all Afghan organizations to cease their activities inside Pakistan and immediately shift their offices to Afghanistan, local paper The Muslim reported today, says Xinhua.

The step has been taken in keeping with the policy of the government to remain neutral in respect of the prevailing situation in Afghanistan and not to allow its soil to be used by any faction of Afghan Mujahideen against its rivals, the report said.

The government warned all the Afghan groups that if any of them was found indulging in any activity against their rivals, they would be dealt with according to the law and would be obliged to close down their offices in Pakistan.

Reliable sources were quoted as saying that the concerned official agencies had been directed to keep a strict vigilance over the activities of all the Afghan organizations and ensure that none of them sent any equipment, arms or any type of assistance to any of the warring factions inside Afghanistan.

Interim Afghan President Burhanuddin Rabbani has reportedly complained to the Pakistan government that Hizb-i-Islami leader Gulbuddin Hekmatyar continued to receive weapons from Pakistan.

Delhi, Islamabad to talk N-free S Asia

ISLAMABAD, Aug 23: India and Pakistan have agreed to discuss the denuclearization of South Asia and a mutual reduction of conventional weapons, Foreign Secretary Shaharyar Mohammad Khan said here today, reports AFP.

The issues will come up at the next round of talks between the two countries, both of which are believed to possess a nuclear capability, Khan told reporters on his return from talks in New Delhi with his Indian counterpart JN

"We had a positive response from India which was inclined to hold discussions on nuclear non-proliferation and other issues, including a mutual and balanced reduction in conventional weapons," Khan said.

Pakistan wants a regional solution to the issue, saying it can not forego its nuclear options because of concerns over the nuclear prowess of India, which exploded an atomic device in 1974. A proposal by Prime

Minister Nawaz Shartf in June last year for a five-nation conference to devise a regional nuclear non-proliferation regime was given a shoulder by India. Other proposed participants - the United States,

In addition to signing some accords to build mutual confidence, the two sides agreed to talks between their Defence Secretaries to implement a 1989 agreement on troop redeployments on the disputed Siachen Glacier, he said.

There have been skirmishes on the Glacier - described as the highest battle-front in the world - since 1984.

Khan said the Defence Secretaries along with military aides would be meeting some time between mid-October and first half of November to resolve the issue of Stachen which borders Pakistan, China and India.

He welcomed India's will ingness to discuss Kashmir under the bilateral 1972 Simla Agreement on the issue, which has triggered two wars between the South Asian neigh bours since 1947 and continues to cloud relations.

However, he said the "perspectives and interpretations" of the two countries on Kashmir remained "widely different.

He said the 1948 UN Resolutions for a plebiscite in Kashmir and the Simla Agreement "are not mutually exclusive as the UN provided a framework for the settlement while the Simla Agreement offered a means to achieve it."

"I hope that given requisite political will, it should be possible to overcome the divergences and move ahead towards a meaningful dialogue for a final settlement of the dispute, which has bedevilled relations for over four decades," Khan said

BAGHDAD, Aug 23: Iraq said today for the first time that it would respond militarily if the allies imposed an exclusion zone in the south, reports AFP.

The Iraqi people and its armed forces will gouge out the enemy's eyes if they are tempted to attack Iraq,' the Defense Ministry Daily Al-Qaddissiya said after President Saddam Hussein met his Air Force and Air Defense Chiefs.

It gave no details on Saturday's meeting or on the type of military response Iraq would take against an air exclusion zone the United States, Britain and France say they are plan ning to protect Shi'ite Mus-

But the paper clearly backed military action, unlike previous Iraqi statements which called for resistance using all the available means or the 'mobilization' of all resources and the Iraqi people.

Hussein also sent his Defense Minister and cousin Alt Hassan Al-Majid to meet with tribal leaders Saturday in the southern marshes in what newspapers described as a mission to rally the population's support. Iraqi television repeatedly

showed Shi'ite inhabitants of the marshes demonstrating against what the commentator said was the 'plot to divide Iraq' and expressing support for Hussein. Meanwhile, the Iraqi Presi

Malaysian cruise ship sinks: Four killed, 70 hurt

KUALA LUMPUR, Aug 23: The cruise ship Royal Pacific sank Sunday after colliding with a fishing boat, killing at least four people, injuring 70 and leaving up to 28 missing. Rescue ships picked up hun-

dreds of survivors, reports AP. The Royal Pacific had left Singapore on Friday night for a two-day "Cruise to Nowhere" along the Malaysian coast.

The voyage promised "champagne wishes and caviar dreams" in the Greek-owned ship's casino, Karaoke lounge swimming pool and gymnasium, according to a brochure for the tour.

Iraq's Deputy Premier Tareq Aziz went to Sanaa for consultations and called for Yemen's continued support.

Yemen, Sudan and Jordan, which sided with Iraq in the 1991 Gulf war, have denounced the no-fly-zone plan, but even Syria and other Arab nations that fought Iraq have also opposed it or expressed reservations

Reuter from Washington adds: US officials on Saturday warned Baghdad that the western alliance was preparing to shoot down military jets and helicopters over southern Iraq.

Officials of the Bush administration said the United States, Britain and France are expected on Tuesday to begin enforcing a 'no-fly' military zone south of the 32nd parallel in Iraq to prevent Iraqi warplanes from attacking Shi ite Muslim dissidents.

The State Department warned American travellers to avoid Jordan and cautioned against travel in the Middle East, South Asia and North Africa because of mounting tensions with Iraq.

The Jordan warning cited the increased risk of possible terrorist acts directed against the US government or US citizens in the area.


