## DU Students demand terror-free campus

Illias Ali said that a group of armed activists sheltered by a vested quarter was responsible for the trouble on the campus.

Mahbubur Rahman said that the FBCCI would do its best to help rehabilitation of sick in dustries in all possible ways and called upon the owners to approach the government in this respect in a systematic

He said the government had established 'Sick Industries Rehabilitation Cell' last year for the purpose and decided to constitute an 'industrial commission' involving both public and private sectors.

"The industrial consultative committee of the government is now working relentlessly for formulating a realistic frame work of the commission," he said adding that it was a sincere demonstration of the government desire to rehabilitate the sick industries.

Mahbubur Rahman said that the present level of problems due to the sick industries was the result of the non-implementation of government policies during the seventies and the eighties. The government needs time to overcome such a mounting problem," he said.

Rahman urged the government to withhold cases filed against the owners of sick industries and implement its policies in a way so that banks and industries remained safe in the greater interest of the

He also urged the government to realize the loans sanctioned in foreign currency at the exchange rate it was disbursed and said it would be a great help for industrialisation in the country.

The reasons behind the sickness of the industries mentioned by various participants of the conference in cluded devaluation of the cur rency, corruption, disruption in power supply, political unrest, lack of working capital. smuggling, absence of protec tion for local products and bu-

reaucratic tangles. Mirza Abu Mansur, former chief of the Chittagong Chamber of Commerce and Industry who presided over the conference, suggested the setting up of an institution, through enacting a law, to deal with the sick industries.

He was also critical about the filing of cases against the entrepreneurs whose industries had already been identified by the Cell as sick.

In his written speech Mirza Manzur reviewed the overall situation in the industrial sector of the country, identified the problems and suggested a number of measures for government consideration to

### Clinton pledges 8m new jobs

LITTLE ROCK. Arkansas. Aug 31: democratic presidential candidate Bill Clinton pledges in a new television advertisement to create eight million new Jobs during his four-year mandate if he wins the November 3 election. The Republican Party immediately criticized the 60-second advertisement, which was broadcast beginning Monday in several states, as "flying in the face of reality". It is the first time Clinton has put such a high figure on job creation if he wins the White House, previously limiting himself to a piedge of a million new jobs a year through a 20 billion-dollar infrastructure programme, reports AFP.

### Delta rocket launched

CAPE CANAVERAL (Florida), Aug 31: A delta rocket blasted off from here today carrying a television satellite for more than 10,000 cable television systems. The launch was originally scheduled for August 13, but was postponed because a transistor on the spacecraft was found to be faulty. The satellite will replace one of seven similar satellites put into space since 1983 and expected to last 10 years said Walter Braun. senior Vice President of Ge American which owns the spacecraft, reports AFP.
