## EC nations move to deny Y'slav membership

UNITED NATIONS, Sept 15: European nations moved quickly on Tuesday to deny Serb-dominated Yugoslavia voting rights in the new General Assembly session as punishment for its military campaign in Bosnia-Herze-

govina, reports AP. The European Community nations, led by Britain, met Tuesday morning with Security Council members of the Nona council resolution denying the new Yugoslavia's right to participate in UN affairs, including the new 47th General Assembly, which opens Tucsday afternoon.

The move by the Europeans would make Yugoslavia- which now consists only of Serbia and Montenegro- an international pariah, in a class with South Africa, which also has had its voting rights suspended since
