Task Force to thwart Operation Push Back

The government yesterday formed a high-powered task force to thwart the Indian efforts to deport the so-called illegal immigrants from Bangladesh.

Official sources said Home Secretary Manjurul Karim chaired an inter-ministerial meeting yesterday to review the situation after the muchpublicised Indian move to send forcibly Bengali-speaking settlers in various parts of the country other than from West

India has codenamed the massive deportation plan 'Operation Push Back' under which it sent back 132 people last September 11.

The sources said the task force, headed by Additional Home Secretary S Rahman, would coordinate the government activities to deal with the situation.
