# India to strengthen BSF, fence off 537 miles by '96

NEW DELHI, Sept 28: Indian Home Minister S B Chavan said today that India would fence its borders with Bangladesh to prevent Bangladeshis from pouring into the country. reports AFP.

Chavan also said the gov ernment would construct 2,884 kilometres (1,730 miles) of roads to police the frontier region and fence off 896 kilometres (537 miles) of the border by 1996, adding that the measures would cost 277 million dollars.

Engineers have already built 360 kilometres (216 miles) of border roads and put up fences along 77 kilometres (46 miles) of the border.

Chavan said the 80,000man paramilitary Border Security Force (BSF), which he is in charge of, would be strengthened to police the frontier which stretches over rivers, forests and rugged

# 167 killed as Pak plane crashes in Kathmandu

KATHMANDU, Sept 28: A Pakistan International Airlines plane with 167 people on board crashed Monday on its landing approach to this city ringed by Himalayan mountains, reports AP.

Nepalese rescue workers who reached the site said there was little chance of finding survivors, said Nagendra Prasad Ghimire, the deputy chief of Kathmandu airport. Airline officials said most of

the 155 passengers on the Airbus A300 were Europeans. The aircraft carried a crew of 12, they said.

Ghimire said the plane crashed 14 miles south of the airport.

The government is likely to take a final decision today on the fate of National Credit Limited (NCL) that had applied to become a commercial bank.


The decision will be taken at the meeting of the Cabinet Committee on Finance and Financial Matters. The meeting will be chaired
