ductivity of land. On the other hand, rampant use of chemical fertilizers has affected fertility of soil.

The affected thanas are Sadar, Kalaroa, Tala, Debhata, Kaliganj, Shyamnagar and As-

Agriculture Extension Department sources said, fertility of soil depends on its organic chemical and biological ingredients which are formed in cow-dung. There are three per cent of Nitrogen, three per cent of Phosphorus and six per cent of Potash in cow-dung. A ton of cow-dung can produce as much as 20 kg ingredients of chemical fertilizer. But owing to price hike and scarcity of firewood, farmers of the district have been using cow-dung as fuel instead of using the same as traditional fertilizer.

It is learnt that the country gets nearly 2.5 crore tons of cow-dung from the cattleheads trict causing loss to the pro- annually. The large portion of cow-dung is being used as fuel
