He said, "The government had not been much sincere about the three rounds of talks held Since September 22, and by not informing us about this meeting it has once again revealed its insincerity."

"We are ready to cooperate with the government ...", Faisal said, "But it is useless as the government had been rigid in the past rounds of talks."

Out of the 14-point charter of demands, the government had already accepted the first; regularisation of 750 nurses appointed on an ad-hoc basis, and issued an order.
