Bangladesh as the business community responded to the government's private sector investment initiatives.

"Things have really picked up within the last few months," May said "we are currently looking at a number of investment proposals promoted by the Bangladeshi business community, some of which may result in our financial participation in the fu-

The Bank can invest upto 25 per cent of the total project cost, not exceeding 20 million US dollars in this region, by way of loan and or equity and participate as a partner in the enterprise with the associated risks and without government guarantee.
