A total of 11,934 students of Science group came out successful, of whom 2,081 passed in first division, 5,593 in second division and 4,260

in third division. The pass percentage in Science group is 74.63 while it is 63.86 in Humanities group and 79.82 in Commerce group.

A total of 23,908 examinees passed in Humanities group, of whom 484 passed in first division, 7,326 in second division and 16,098 in third division.

The number of pass in Commerce group is 6,349. Of them 84 students passed in first division, 2,256 in second division and 4,009 in third division.

The percentage of pass among the male students is 70.03 while it is 65.53 among the female students.

Rajshahi College dominated the merit lists of the three groups. Of the 20 top positions in Science group the students of the college obtained nine positions while in Humanities and Commerce groups they secured 14 and 16 positions respectively. Rajshahi Cadet College, Rangpur Cadet College, Pabna Cadet College and Govt Azizul Huq College are among the other institutions which followed the Rajshahi College with several students in the merit lists.

eration in this regard. In a blistering attack on the government for pursuing "a bankrupt foreign policy," Hastna said "the people want to know what other secret deals the Prime Minister has made with India during her visit, besides signing the communique."

She was also bitterly critical of the Foreign Minister and the Foreign Office and asked what they did when even some Indian newspapers wrote against the push-back opera-

Hasina asked the Foreign Minster to explain the words "large scale" and "illegal immigrants" which he uttered in his statement in parliament Monday initiating the discussion on the push-in by India.

Responding to the Indian action, she said many people crossed the borders from both sides of India and Bangladesh since 1947 and began inhabiting the two countries perma-

Recalling the exodus of refugees to India during the 1971 liberation war, Hasina made it clear that the refugees who took shelter in India returned to Bangladesh after independence.

The opposition leader said the push-in operation sparked off unrest and tension along the border. She warned that the present government will have to bear the responsibility of any failure in tackling the situation in bordering areas with India and Myanmar.

"People will never take the risk of losing independence and sovereignty due to the folly of the BNP government. Awami League as well as the people will not accept it."

Hasina demanded settlement of the complex situation with the neighbouring countries through mutual discus-

In her 30-minute speech Hasina referred to bilateral issues with India, new move of constructing road and erecting barbed wire fences along the Indo-Bangladesh border and the refugee problem with Myanmar.

She said the government has failed to resolve the sharing of the Ganges water and the problem of Myanmar refugees.

### Greens Party founder found dead

BONN, Oct 20: Petra Kelly, one of the founders of Germany's 'Green Movement', was killed by her companion, former army general Gerd Bastian, who then shot himself in the head, police announced in a news conference Tuesday, reports AFP.

The bodies of Bastian, 69. and Kelly, 45, were discovered late Monday in their Bonn

The bodies of Kelly and Gerd Bastian, 69, had been in the house "for a quite a while" and bore wounds of unspecified origin, prosecutor

Wolfgang Komp said.

"All hypotheses are possible, from suicide to murder, he added

Kelly, 45, had led the huge protest campaign against the deployment of US nuclear missiles in Germany in the early 1980's.

Her companion, Gerd Bastian, 69, was a former army general and leading figure in the Greens Party.

The two were among the first Greens to be elected to parliament in 1983 and served in the legislature until 1990.

Foreign Minister A S M Mostafizur Rahman re-discovered his own boisterous self yesterday, proving he is much more at home with impromptu speeches, interjected with witty observations, than with written texts prepared by midlevel officers of the Foreign Ministry.

"How can I take this body of mine anywhere surreptitiously?", asked the six feetplus minister, in reply to Sheikh Hasina's allegations that he had concluded the treaty with Myanmar on repatriation of the Rohingya refugees under cover, "I do everything in public, I don't do anything behind curtains."

He didn't say if "everything" really meant everything.

Deputy Leader of the House Badruddoza Chowdhury thought he had a point when he attracted the House's attention to Article 18 of the joint communique issued on behalf of former president Hussain Muhammad Ershad and the then Indian prime minister Indira Gandhi in 1984.

That article, Chowdhury pointed out, referred movement of peoples across their borders", similar to Article 11 of the Khaleda-Rao communique which had truly been taken to the cleaners by Opposition members during this discussion.

Hasina however reminded the House that the 1992 communique had referred to "illegal immigration of peoples" which was different from mere "movement of people".

The definition of immigration, illegal or otherwise, is "coming to settle into another country". (In yesterday's Gallery, the definitions of 'refugee' and 'immigrant' were

given correctly, but were inadvertently mixed-up and put under wrong headings. It was a mistake for which no amount of apology will be enough, and so none is being offered).

The Foreign Minister himself had to deal with a bit of printing error. Hasina complained that the minister's statement, made from the written speech, had said "after independence in the late '70s.." This, Hasina maintained, showed Rahman had no knowledge of, nor sympathy for, the country's independence which came about in 1971.

"This was a printing error," the minister said, defending his credentials as a pro-independence person, "in my speech I had only said 'after independence', but the words 'in the late '70s' got into the text as an error."

Another poll by ABC-TV showed that Clinton was currently leading in 31 states with 368 electoral votes and Bush in 11 states with 74 votes. Ninety-six electoral electoral votes were still undecided, because in the remaining states currently both Clinton and Bush were

Some highlights of the debate:

Taxes: Bush argued that Clinton couldn't be trusted to keep his pledge to raise taxes only on the rich. "Mr and Mrs America ... watch your wallet because his figures don't add up and he's going to sock it right." Clinton said Bush had no credibility on the tax issue. Perot said he would raise taxes, asking voters "to take fair, shared sacrifice."

Vietnam draft: Clinton said he did not regret his opposition to the Vietnam War, but said he wished he had done a better job responding to questions about the steps he took to avoid the draft. Bush

said the issue wasn't avoiding the draft but whether Clinton's answers were part of a "pattern" of evasive answers. Perot came to Clinton's defense, saying, "I don't look

Iraq: Perot alleged that Bush had in effect told Saddam Hussein he could seize northern Kuwait and then "we went nuts" and to war when the Iraqi leader seized the entire emirate. Bush responded angrily, saying it was a matter of 'national honour" to deny Perot's allegation. Clinton gave Bush credit for his war leadership but said Bush should own up to "coddling" Saddam even after he used mustard gas against his own people.

Their debate series over, Clinton and Bush began on Tuesday what promises to be a heated and heetic campaign

Bush headed south Tuesday for a train tour of Georgia and South Carolina to try to rebuild a crumbling Republican base. Clinton looked to solidify leads in Illinois and Wisconsin before a swing through Western states that were once thought solid Republican territory.
