Tk 170 cr rural uplift project taken up for implementation

RAJSHAHI, Oct 23: The second phase of the North-West Rural Development Project will be taken up for implementation on next January at a cost about Tk 170 erore, official sources here said, reports UNB.

Bangladesh Rural Development Board will implement the project and Asian Development Bank will give the monetary assistance.

The works will include extension and strengthening of the cooperative societies of BRDB, training programmes of the wealthless and unemployed distressed people for self-employment, disbursement of loans and so on.

A plan has already been undertaken to set up a centre at Rajshahi for supervision of

the second phase work. The project will be extended to 97 thanas of 16 districts of the western and southern regions of the country. The districts are Rajshahi, Natore, Naogaon, Nawabgani, Pabna, Sirajganj, Kushtia, Chuadanga, Meherpur, Jessore, Magura, Jhenidah, Narail, Faridpur, Rajbari, Madaripur, Shariatpur and Gopalganj.

The first phase of the North-West Rural Development Project in greater Rajshahi, Pabna and Kushtia regions was completed during the last financial year.

Training course on productivity measurement ends

A six-day training course on 'productivity measurement techniques in the engineering sector' ended in the city Thursday, reports BSS.

Madaripur textile mills incurs Tk 23cr loss

MADARIPUR, Oct 23: Madaripur Textile Mills of Bangladesh Textile Mills Corporation (BTMC) has incurred loss of about Tk 23 crore in the last 13 years since its installation, reports UNB.

The textile mills was established in 1979 at a cost of taka 25 crore with the financial assistance from Romania.

But due to mismanagement. corruption, want of spare parts, scarcity of cotton, electricity problem, political unrest and frequent strike by the workers caused the heavy loss during the period, sources alleged.

Price hike of fertilizer threatens

aman output

GAZIPUR, Oct 23: The price hike of chemical fertilizers in the district has posed a threat to production of transplanted aman crop, reports UNB.

At present a 50 kg bag of urea is being sold at Taka 350 as against previous price of Taka 245 while TSP and MP at Taka 450 and Taka 400 as against Taka 330 and 272 respectively.

Farmers said the fertilizers were distributed through Bangladesh Agriculture Development Corporation beforehand which ensured the distribution with fair prices.

But recently the government has withdrawn BADC's involvement in the distribution system that facilitated the dealers' monopoly market resulting the artificial crisis and price hike.

British growth may be too late, say economists

Prices of some essentials up winter vegetables arrive

Friday bring both, good news and bad news for the buyers.

The good news is; early arrival of fresh winter vegetables which can be bought at a reasonably cheaper price.

The bad news; prices of most of the other vegetables, sugar, fine rice and fishes surged.

The amazing price hike was noticed on Thursday in sugar and fine rice. A kg of sugar which was not more than Taka 28 a couple of weeks ago, now stands at no less than Taka 35.

Similarly, fine rice which was available at Taka 24 a kg reached Taka 35 within a couple of months.

"Smuggled Indian sugar," said a grocery shop keepers at the New Market, which used to stabilise the sugar supply and its price has stopped coming... for which the price is going up." Rice whole sal ers at Badamtoli commenting on the price hike of fine rice said that this year the smuggling of

and the country itself did not produce a good quality fine

Meanwhile, fresh winter vegetables like cauliflower. cabbage, beans and onion stalks are starting to arrive in the city markets.

"By the grace of Allah," says one vegetables seller, "the cultivation of winter vegetables began earlier this year than the previous years. I feel buyers will be able to get those at a cheaper price.

A small cabbage cost Taka 12 now, which had its earlier price at taka 20.

Each cauliflower, though small, is sold at Taka six and a small bundle of onion stalks is sold at Taka five.

Tomato is also available. The best quality is sold at Taka 50 per kg. But those are not fresh. The shop keepers informed that some tomatos come from last years stock while the rest, come from India.

The prices of karala, patal, paptya, green chilly, all season beans and other similar vegetables were soaring high. Green chilly, available at

Taka 16 per kg reached Taka 30 with the last one month. Karala, four Taka per kg earlier jumped to Taka 14. In the same manner bean reached Taka 14 from Taka 11 and papriced at eight from three, However, with the fresh arrival of bringele, (Taka 14 per kg), the price of old bringele dropped from taka eight to five.

Prices of fishes like pangas and hilsa went up by Taka 10 to 20 per kg due to declining supply. Pangas now cost Taka 130 a piece from taka, 110 while medium size hilsa cost ing Taka 35 earlier, now cost 45 to 50 taka. Large size hilsa is not available in the market.

The prices of plain rice went down by one Taka per kg. Nazir Shail rice sold at Taka 16 per kg now cost Taka 15 and the Jingashai sold Taka 13 now reached Taka 15 per kg. Irri dropped from Taka 11 to Taka 10.

Engine boats driving country boatmen to extreme hardships

MADARIPUR, Oct 23 Hundreds of traditional boat men have been passing their days in extreme hardships as a large number of mechanised boats are plying on different routes of the district, reports

The engine boats are ferrying passengers from Cargoni, Rajoir, Kalkini, Shibchar and Sadar thanas. As a result, the traditional boatmen of these areas have been facing uncertainty being unable to earn their livelihood.

Mentionable that the number of engine boats has steadily increased over the years, while journey by these boats are often hazardous and risky due to lack of proper system.

In most boats there is no system for controlling the speed during the service time. A boat can not be halted in case of emergency. The light engine boats can go forward but cannot go backward in

times of necessity. Instead of search light, the boat owners use low powered torch light which can endanger the lives of passengers any time. The drivers are also not trained and most of them have no licence.

According to government rules survey and registration of these boats are must, but nobody abides by the rules. The law enforcing agencies are not taking any action against the illegal plying of boats for the reasons best known to them

Chilli growers face seed scarcity

Chilli growers of the district have been facing much difficulties due to scarcity of high yielding seeds and price hike of inputs.

According to informed sources, the district is famous for chilli cultivation. Every year about 5,000 acres of land are brought under chilli cultivation in the district. The surplus production of chilli is supplied to different parts of the coun-

A grower has to spend Taka 5000 for cultivating chilli on one acre of land but the production is decreasing day by day due to shortage of capital and other necessary ingredi-

Moreover, every year the chilli cultivation is badly affected by natural calamities including flood, drought and heavy downpour.
