



Sweden, Oct 30: Red-hot Henrik Holm upset world No 1 Jim Courier

Local cricket lovers may get a glimpse of some international cricketers early ne-

Wrapped in the tinsel of the old adage "there is many a slip betwixt cup and the lip" this carrot was dangled by Raisuddin Ahmed, the vice president of Bangladesh Cricket Control Board (BCCB) after his return from the ACC meeting in Lahore, Pakistan, at an impromptu press conference at the BCCB office.

World champions Pakistan will reportedly pay a visit to Bangladesh on their way home from Down Under, where they are to play the triangular World Series Cup limited-overs contest along with Australia and the West Indies

Although the Pakistan Cricket Control Board (BCCP) in principle agreed to the BCCB<sub>a</sub> proposal uncertainty looms large over the yet undiscussed guarantee money of the visitors,

Although lot of ifs and buts are there in the aired tour of the Pakistan national team in mid-January Dhaka's role as the hosts of a four-nation tournament comprising South Asian countries is almost confirmed. Likely to be held in mid-December this year, the tournament will reportedly feature 'B' or second string teams from India, Shri Lanka and Pakistan while the hosts Bangladesh pit their best eleven.

The overtly taciturn BCCB VP informed the 'lucky journalists' of the acceptance of too Bangladeshi proposals for the improvement of the game in Asia. One outlined a triennial tournament of the ICC Associate Members along with three full members of the ICC to add to the colour and quality of the tournament. The proposal, however, contains a rider clause that the ICC full members bear the expenses in the event of the tournament being staged in any of the Associate Member countries.

However, this stipulation will not matter if the oil rich United Arab Emirates (UAE) chips in to host the tournament.

The second Bangladesh proposal dealt with the exchange of visits of junior teams of the three Asian Test playing nations - India, Pakistan and Shri Lanka - and the other as-

sociate members of the ICC. The Bangladesh national team will reportedly visit India, Shri Lanka and Pakistan prior to their departure for Nairobi, the capital of Kenya. the venue for the next ICC Trophy in Feb-March, 1994.

A foreign coach will soon be here to tune up the Bangladesh ICC Trophy squad. Although the BCCB vice president didn't mention any names, yet informed sources said former Pakistani Test Star Mudassar Nazar and Waseem Raja or Indian Test star Mohinder Amarnath are the most likely candidate for the coach's job. For the record, the present

BCCB committee which has done very little regarding trips to Dhaka by foreign teams, had earlier promised to bring Pakistan and Shri Lanka immediately after the World Cup last March. Alasl nothing came of those grandiose plans.
