25 students injured in police firing

CHITTAGONG, Nov 3: At least 25 people were injured with bullet when police fired on student demonstration at Nizampur College Mirerswarai thana today, re-

ports UNB. Five workers of pro-Awami League Chhatra League were admitted to Chittagong Medical College Hospital with bullet wounds. Condition of two was stated critical, hospital sources said.

Officials claimed police on duly fired back 36 shots at the gun-firing students. Witnesses said police fired indiscriminately on the students.

The armed clash erupted when police tried to remove road blocks put up by Chhatra League workers on the Dhaka-Chittagong Highway near Nizampur College at about 12.30 pm.

Earlier, the demonstrators brought out a procession in the college compound and barricaded the road in protest against Monday's clash between Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal and Chhatra League activists at Mirerswarai College that left two students injured.

Following today's police-

student clash, road communication between Dhaka and Chittagong was disrupted for hours till 9.30 pm.


