If it is wordy and diffuse or difficult, we lay it aside as something we ought to read when we have time; but in the competition for our attention, the chances are against our going back to it. We find other material less demanding of us.

Labours main force behind economic development'

Labour and Manpower Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan yesterday said the government was taking all possible efforts to build up the country's economic infrastructure, reports BSS.

He said the democratic process which has been attained by the combined struggle of all sections of people including the labours would not exist if the limited resources of the country could not be increased.

The Minister was addressing a rally of disabled freedom fighters and labours and employees of Freedom Fighter Welfare Trust arranged by the Federation of the Labours and Employees of the Trust at Teigaon here.

He said the labours are the main force behind the country's economic development and the government is concerned about their problems. But the labours in different industrial units also have the responsibilities to raise the production for the betterment of the nation as well as their own.

Referring to the world economic situation, he said reduction of production cost along with increased production also should be taken into consideration to keep pace with the competitive world market.

Mannan said during the past autocratic regime, the economic base of the country was almost destroyed. Inheriting the huge anomalies in the industrial sector, the ruling party is now trying to generate pace in production.

Referring to the employment constraints in the agricultural fields, the Minister said industrial development is a must to minimise the employment problems in the

country. He said government has

taken different initiatives to revive the sick industrial units side by side establishing new units. Cooperation of all concerned is required in this regard for the sake of political and economic stability, he said.

Mannan regretted that while the government is endeavouring to ensure the process of democracy, the opposition parties are trying to disrupt the ruling party's efforts.

X-ray machines in rural hospitals not maintained properly Take steps to modernise radiology, pathology depts: Medical experts

Medical scientists here yesterday urged the government to take initiative to modernise the radiology and pathology departments in hospitals with new technology to ensure proper treatment of patients

in the country, reports BSS. They said, hospitals can only be recognised as fullfledged when their Radiology and Pathology departments are modernised but unfortunately they are still lagging far behind the minimum level of international standard in this regard.

The medical scientists were speaking at the inaugural ceremony of the third national convention of "Bangladesh Society of Radiology and Imaging" at Hotel Sonargaon with its President Prof S A Sobhart in the chair.

Ahmed said the problems in treatment of patients could be reduced substantially with the proper utilisation and maintenance of the available machinery and equipment in hospi-

He said modern equipment like X-ray machines were supplied to the hospitals in mufassil areas but they were not being properly maintained or

In his presidential address, Prof S A Sobhan said the health sector could be developed to the standard of other Asian countries by properly utilising the money allocated

He urged for modernising the X-ray departments in all hospitals and medical colleges by installing ultra-sonogram machine there. Prof Sobhan said X-ray was

being done here with low standard of equipment which was not beyond doubt whether it was "machine radiation leak proof.

That is why, he said, issuance of clearance is very much necessary before marketing of an X-ray machine. Prof ASQ Muhammad

Sadeque called for installation of "CT scan" and "MRI ma chine" in the IPGMR and "CT scan" in the medical college hospitals in the greater interest of treatment. He also called for maintain-

ing consistency in the appointment of medical teachers and specialists from IPGMR to thana level to ensure proper and modern education as well as proper treatment. Prof Sadeque stressed the

need for enactment of law under the title "Radiation Protection Law" on the basis of the International Commission for Radiation Protection in view of the hazard created by the private X-ray clinics in the country.

"An X-ray clinic should be established in a specially built building to protect the neighbours from radiation hazard," he said regretting that in most cases this rule was not being followed.

He urged the government to make arrangement for training of the radiologists abroad

Pilgrim management fund board may be formed

The government is actively considering to set up a "pilgrim management fund board" to enable the people, specially those of the lower income group, to perform the Hall, reports BSS.

The pilgrim management fund board will be like the "Tabung Haji" (Pilgrims Management and Fund Board Malaysia), which has been functioning there very successfully since 1963.

State Minister for Religious Affairs Prof M A Mannan, who returned home Saturday after studying the system of "Tabung Haji" in Malaysia, told BSS yesterday that preliminary steps had already been taken to study pros and cons about introducing such a system in the country.

In Malaysia, people intending to perform Hajj deposit money with the "Tabung Hajf" in instalment and the money is invested in various industries and businesses.

When the invested money with the profit becomes enough to cover the pilgrim expenses, the "Tabung Haji" authorities invite the depositor to perform Hajj. The authorities also look after the Hajj management.

The State Minister for Religious Affairs, who led a three-member Bangladesh delegation, said the Malaysian side appreciated the proposal for setting up an organisation in Bangladesh similar to the Tabung Haji".

Abang Abu Bakar Bin Datu Bandar Abang Haji Mustapha, Minister for Religious Affairs in the Prime Minister's department and in-charge of "Tabung Haji" told him that Malaysia was ready to offer all kinds of technical help and cooperation to Bangladesh in this regard. He said one of the deputy


