MELBOURNE, Dec 14: Inspirational West Indies captain Richi Richardson rates himself an even chance of playing in Tuesday's World Series Cup cricket one-dayer against Australia at the Melbourne Cricket Ground, reports AFP.

Richardson, who has shouldered much of the batting responsibility on the tour of Australia, damaged his lower back during last Saturday's four-run win over Pakistan in Adelaide.

Richardson said here Monday he would have a fitness test prior to the start of the clash between the two leading WSC teams.

"I'll see again tomorrow how I feel, but it has been improving really fast," he said.

" I think there's an even chance I'll play. My problem is when I throw the ball and also when I swing the bat. I feel the pain then but I feel a lot better than vesterday and I'm getting a lot of treatment, so I'm very hopeful.

He will definitely miss the second Test starting Dec. 26 in Melbourne and the third Test starting Jan. 2 in Sydney.

Reid, who took six wickets in the first Test in Brisbane earlier this month, underwent surgery in Melbourne last week to repair a small tear in the tendon surrounding his left shoulder.

COLOMBO. Dec 14: Shri Lanka's cricketers, a decade on from their Test debut, have finally come of

age, emerging from a rewarding summer ready for their next major challenge, reports

"Our cricket has matured over the past decade. Now we have the experience and the skill to win our First Test overseas," manager Duleep Mendis told AFP. Shri Lanka are celebrating

the Test and one-day series win against New Zealand who lost the final one-day game here Sunday. Shri Lanka scored their

first win in 11 Tests against New Zealand and only their third in 42 Tests. The Kiwis left for home today a day earlier than scheduled. The triumph followed on

the back of a strong performance against Australia in August and September when Shri Lanka narrowly lost a hard-fought-three-Test series 1-0 and won the three-match one-day series 2-0. Mendis, 40, who captained

Shri Lanka in their two previ-

ous Test wins, against India in 1985 and Pakistan in 1986 in Colombo, believes his side are now ready for their next big step - victory overseas. \*

Since making their Test debut against England in 1982, Shri Lanka have never won abroad. Mendis is still angered by criticism first levelled by Indian star Kapil Dev that the team can only on home soil. "Such remarks were made

by some overseas players to cast aspersions on our umpires. It is quite unfair to judge the team's performance by our umpiring," said Mendis who captained 19 of his 24 Tests for Shri Lanka. "There were times we

thought that the umpiring went against us in the series against Australia. The New Zealand team has given a lot of credit to : our umpires in this series." Shri Lanka may have to

wait, however, for the chance to prove themselves away from

Cricket officials have no plans for tours abroad next year and the 1994 programme has yet to be finalised. Mendis is angered by critics

of the tour in mid-November. They still had a good batting line-up. They had Martin Crowe, Ken Rutherford and Andrew) Jones. They lost only Mark Greatbatch," he said.

Mendis said it was fronic that when Shri Lanka lost several good players who went on a rebel tour of South Africa in October 1982, no one "Talked about a weak Shri Lankan side." That toured New Zealand later that year losing the series 2-0.

Mendis paid tribute to the New Zealanders for deciding to continue the tour instead of taking." the first available flight home" after the bombing in which five people died outside the team's hotel

"They staying behind averted a disaster for Shri Lanka's cricket. Had they gone it would have ruined our future programmes. By continuing the tour, it also provided our young cricketers a lot of exposure," he said.

Mendis said that skipper Arjuna Ranatunga had a wellbalanced side with batsmen of the calibre of Roshan Mahanama, who had brilliant series against New Zealand, and an array of talented bowlers.

"Arjuna is fast-improving as a captain. There was a time when we used to send messages to him in the field. Now he is thinking on his own. That is good for him and the team. Shri Lanka can hold its own against most sides," he said.

Before departing for home, Crowe told national television that it had been a disappointmg tour for New Zealand and had the side been at full strength "it would have been an evenly-matched series."
