ADB to give \$55m for flood protection project

Asian Development Bank (ADB) has approved a 55 million US dollar loan for the Secondary Towns Integrated Flood Protection Project in Bangladesh, reports UNB.

The loan, to be drawn from the concessional Asian Development Fund, carries a service charge of 1 per cent per annum and has a repayment period of 40 years, including a grace period of 10 years, according to a news reease.

The project area covers the six towns of Khulna, Dinajpur, Kurigram, Panchagarh, Habigani, and Maulvibazar which have as their highest priority flood protection.

Chinese attack threatens HK stability

HONG KONG, Dec 23 Chinese threats to nullify all Hong Kong-related business contracts after Beijing's takeover of the territory in 1997 violate international law and threaten Hong Kong's stability, an influential legal group said Wednesday, reports AP.

In comments likely to fan the increasingly nasty Sino-British dispute- over Hong Kong's future, the Hong Kong Bar Association said the Chinese warnings smacked of political gamesmanship and had 'no foundation in interna tional law.

They suggest that constitutional provisions are not taken seriously, and their interpretation may be subject to the whim of prevailing political consideration. The statements endanger the continuation of the rule of law both now and after 1997," the statement

BSCIC sets up 144 units in 6 northern dists

NATORE, Dec 23 Bangladesh Small and Cottage Industries Corporation has set up 144 small industries in six northern districts at a cost of Taka 47 crore, reports UNB.

Of the total, 16 small industries have been established in Rajshahi, 53 in Bogra, 7 in Rangpur, 29 in Dinajpur and 9 in Nilphamari districts.

Meanwhile, the works on a number of industrial estates in 10 northern districts with the assistance of BSCIC are going on in full swing.

According to a reliable source, about Taka 14 crore would be spent for the implementation of these projects.

The industrial estates are being set up in Natore, Naogaon, Chapainawbganj, Sirajganj, Kurigram, Joypurhat, Lalmonirhat, Gaibandha, Thakurgaon and Panchagarh districts.

With the implementation of the projects, a large number of unemployed persons of the region will get job opportuni-

About nine thousand of con-

sumers of Natore Palli Biddyt Samity (NPBS-2) have failed to pay their electricity bills amounting to Taka 1.5 crore.

A report said the collection was satisfactory in the 1991-92 fiscal after withdrawal of the facility for payment in installments.

.There had been 36 per cent disconnections for non-payment of electricity bills last year, the report said.

The NPBS-2 earned Taka 5,21,55,390 by distributing more than 1.77 crore KWH electricity in the fiscal 1991-

The Samity paid over 5 crore to the Power Development Board for about two crore kilowatt during the period.

The system loss of Samity has been reduced by five per cent from 23.18 per cent in the last year.

The NPBS-2 covers 620 villages in 1232 square kilometers and 24,566 consumers connected 1,224 kilometers of distribution lines in Natore and Rajshahi districts.

M Majid-ul-Haq informed the IFDC director about the quality, using procedures and the marketing system of ferlitizer in Bangladesh. IFDC director appreciated the steps of the present government in providing continued help to the farmers for boosting agriculture production. The Minister said Bangladesh will be self-sufficient within a few years in food sector if the present trend of agricultural production continues.

Plan to disburse Tk 40 lakh among growers of betel leaf

RAJSHAHI, Dec 23: Rajshahi Krishi Unnayan Bank has taken up a programme for distribution of Taka 40 lakh as loan to boost betel leaf production during the current season, reports UNB.

According to sources, about 10,000 families of Tanore Bagmara, Mohanpur and Durgapur thanas are engaged in betel leaf cultivation.

But shortage of capital and necessary inputs, marketing problems and high transportation cost have been hampering betel leaf production.

Present policy to help boost trade, investment: Zahir

Planning Minister A M Zahiruddin Khan Wednesday said that the economic reform measures and the policy of trade liberalisation being pursued by the present government were directed to boost the trading and investment opportunities in the country, reports BSS.

There was no alternative to encouraging the trade for achieving the accelerated growth of the economy, the Planning Minister said while inaugurating a workshop on "expansion of trade and promotion of business opportunities in Bangladesh.

The day-long workshop jointly organised by the **Economic Commission for Asia** and the Pacific (ESCAP). Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and

Industry (FBCCI) and the Ministry of Commerce is one of a series of national workshops being held in a number of countries commensurate with the decision taken on a regional seminar on the "expansion of business opportunities in Asia and the Pacific region" held in Bangkok in September this year.

The objective of the seminar is to enhance and sharpen national awareness and perception of the vast potential for interregional trade and investment in Asia and the Pactfic which can be better exploited through appropriate initiative.

It also aims at identifying and discussing the obstacles faced by the business community in expanding their trade with other countries in Asia

and Pacific such as tariff and non- tariff barriers. Lack of market information and absence of business of contact with a view to finding appropriate solutions.

Chaired by FBCCI President Mahbubur Rahman, the inaugural session was also addressed by UNDP Resident Representative Charles H Larsimont, Commerce Secre tary Nazem Ahmed Chowdhury and ESCAP Regresentative H Fujimoto.

One country paper on business and investment opportunities in Bangladesh and two ESCAP studies one on "expansion of trade and investment among ESCAP developing countries with a regional framework" and empirical study of trade and investment with the Asia and Pacific region" would be presented at the workshop.

Govt refixes raw jute export price

The government has reduced the export price of raw jute of different grades by 15-35 US dollar per metric ton, reports UNB.

Officials told UNB that the export price had been refixed for the second time in the current season due to worldwide downtrend trend of jute trade.

The decision was taken at a meeting of advisory committee of Export Price Check (EPC) on Dec 20 with Jute Secretary Akhtar Ali in the chair.

The new export price was effected from December 21. Earlier, raw jute export price was reduced on September 2 by 10 to 30 US dollar per ton. EPC comprises representatives from Bangladesh Jute Association. Bangladesh Jute

Exporters Association, Bangla desh Jute Mills Association, Bangladesh Jute Spinners Association and Bangladesh

Per ton of BWC fute was fixed at 310 US dollar as against 335 dollar, BWD 260 US dollar against 290 dollar, BWE 225 US dollar against 255 dollar, BTC 315 US dollar against 345 dollar, BTD 265 US dollar against 300 dallar, BTE 230 US dallar against 265 dallar. BWCA at 165 US dollar against 185 dollar, BWCB 150 US dollar against 165 dollar and BTCA 180 US dollar

against 195 dollar. The export target of raw jute was fixed at 18 lakh bales valued at Taka 391 crore for fiscal 1992-93 and 7.26 lakh

bales of raw jute worth Taka 143 crore was exported till December 15.

In 1991-92, export of raw jute stood at 16 lakh bales worth about Taka 3.50 crore against the target of 18 lakh bales.

Lack of worthwhile trade enquiries and financial constraints of traders due to nonrenewal of bank loans were the main reasons for the dull market situation, Vice- Chairman of Bangladesh Jute Association Rezaul Karim told UNB Wednesday.

The government announced a few months back that it would release funds of Taka 350 crore for the jute mills both in the public and private sector and traders during the

current season to reinvigorate the already shaken jute sector. But no fruitful arrangement

has yet been made in this regard, Karim said adding that many jute traders and exporters are in a deplorable condition due to bank- debt crisis arising from wrong policy of the previous govern-

Farmers are not getting fair prices due to dull market situation, he said adding that jute is now selling at Taka 200 per maund on an average against the production cost of Taka 300 per maund.

He urged the government to release adequate funds for the jute traders to accelerate the pace of jute sector and ensure fair price for the farmers.
