# Repatriation now starts from Jan

The repatriation of stranded Pakistanis scheduled to begin this month will now start from early next month. reports UNB.

A Foreign Office spokesman said yesterday the first batch of stranded Pakistanis is expected to leave for Pakistan in early January and the exact date of departure is to be confirmed by the Pakistan government soon.

He said the Bangladesh goverriment had made necessary arrangements for the repatriation to commence by the end

of this month but the Pakistan government has now indicated that due to some logistic and practical problems, the repatriation process will start from January, 1993.

Pakistan agreed on the repatriation of the first batch of some 3,000 families of stranded Pakistants by December, 1992 during Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia's visit to Pakistan in last August.

The repatriation was to commence on completion. The first phase of construction of housing facilities in Pakistan.


