# DOWN TO EARTH

# City's Oldest Hospital Ailing

The Mitford Hospital is the city's oldest medical institution. In was established in 1858 in the old part of the city, which has now grown to be highly congested. So much so that it involves a tremendous waste of energy and time to reach the hospital premises through any of the existing routes. The road itself, the Mitford Road, on which it stands, presents a deplorable sight with constant traffic jams created by trucks, rickshaws, push carts, and the like. Along with the hospital

there was a medical school conducting LMF course which continued till 1972, when on its conversion, Sir Salimullah Medical College came into be-

The present Mitford Hospital is a 600-bed hospital with a daily attendance of 590 outdoor patients on an average. Since its conversion into a hospital of a medical college, it has been suffering from infrastructural inadequacies in several ways. This has been reportedly due to the absence of a full-time Project Director for the new construction scheme. This also accounts for lack of coordination among the sectors of the scheme. For example, provision of toilets in the chambers of the departmental heads could not yet be made. There is also lack of space in the rooms for the attending doctors of the different departments.

Only one lift operates in the new building. As a result, there is always a long queue of waiting patients and their attendants. In the scheme there is provision for three other lifts in the new building but the work in that connection was found to be progressing very slowly. One source, however, assured that one of the lifts would be operational sometime

As gathered from sources, other departments of the hospital have also their problems or deficiencies. On the side of general facilities, it was learnt that there is at present no cabin system in the hospital. The pre-existing cabins have been converted into dormitories for internee doctors for want of accommodation for them elsewhere. As a result, no treatment is available for patients seeking cabins. There is also no arrangement for paying beds. This entails considerable loss of revenue for the government from the income of cabins and paying beds.

Orthopaedic Department, which has been in existence in the hospital for the last eleven years, is yet to have a separate operation theatre. The surgeons of this department have to wait their turns for use of the operation theatre in a rotation with the general surgeons, with the result that operation cases, pile up. There is also no separate Orthopaedic Ward or fullfledged Physiotherapy Department.

The existing Casualty Block is in name only: it is not yet operational for want of airconditioning facility.

In the Gynae Department, the operation theatre appeared to be functioning in cramped space. The absence of a door to the entrance of the OT makes it highly susceptible to the risk of infection. Sterilisation of operation instruments is delayed for want of adequate gas supply there. The heavy pressure on the Gynae Ward, attending an average of 50-60 patients a day, poses problems for the understaffed doctors and nurses. The Psychiatric Ward appeared to be in a neglected state. It is not clear how far the remodelling work going on there will improve the situation. But the main problem, as reported, relates to the availability of psychiatric drugs for the treatment of mental patients. The drugs are usually high-priced and not supplied by the hospital. As a result, most of the patients, being poor, cannot afford to buy such drugs from outside and consequently their treatment suf-

The hospital suffers from absence of certain other facilities/departments which are normally found in a full-fledged hospital. For example, there are no burn unit, gastro-enterology, radio-therapy, neorosurgery, urology, ultrasonography, ecocardiography, nephrology departments in the

Hospital sources further indicate that there are other acute in adequacies in the hospital's supporting facilities. About the supply of drugs and medicines for the patients, the situation is equally deplorable Except for a few low-priced standard medicines, other medicines in most cases are not supplied by the hospital.

The situation is no better in respect of patient's diet. It is poor in quality and quantity. It has been observed that in most cases the patients try to overcome the deficiency in food by purchases from outside.

According to hospital ad ministrators, financial constraints stand in the way of desired improvements. It is, however, generally felt by observers that if the functionaries of the hospital are more considerate and humane in their approach to duties and services, the over-all situation can be less frustrating for the

orphans BAIDOA, Somalia, Jan 1: U.S President George Bush visited US troops and orphans famine and civil war in Somalia's city of death today on the second day of his new year visit, reports Reuter.

The outgoing President flew by helicopter from the assault ship Tripoli off Mogadishu to Baidoa, the centre of the famine in Somalia and a major base for the American-led multinational task force protecting relief supplies.

At Baidoa airbase, US troops showed him weapons and technical gunwagons they have scized from Somali gunmen. He then drove into town by

armoured vehicle to a home for 700 Somalt orphans. Bush was flying on to Bali

Dogle, about halfway between Baidoa and Mogadishu, to eat a ration pack lunch with troops at the Soviet-built military air-Bush, wearing a camouflage

shirt and cap and pale khaki trousers, saw some 200 captured weapons including recoilless rifles and Kalashnikov assault rifles at the Baidoa base

US marines and crack French troops secured the base and town, 250 km (150 miles) west of Mogadishu, on December 16 in the first major ground thrust in land by the task force.

They said that a Member of the Managing Committee, Kamruzzaman Khan Jasu, at a meeting of the Committee on December 10 presented a list of 11 specifie charges against the Chairman.

Donors at the April meeting of the Aid Club pledged for Bangladesh food aid of 216 million US dollars. Except Japan, no other member of the Club had converted its pledge into a commitment as yet, sources added.

Bangladesh is yet to get any pledge for food aid except that of the Aid Club in the current fiscal year.

Meanwhile, the government has started looking for countries to export this year's surplus rice, Food Ministry sources said adding that moves were underway to export rice to Shri Lanka and Saudi Arabia.
