Cold wave in northern dists kills 40 in 2 weeks

RANGPUR, Jan 9: Severe cold wave that has been sweeping over four districts of Rangpur with mercury fluctuating between five and nine degrees Celsius for past two weeks has claimed at least 40

The cold wave killed fifteen at Lalmonirhat, twelve at Kurigram, ten at Rangpur and three at Nilphamari districts.

Gusty wind turned cyclonic storm Friday left several hundred katcha dwellings and tin sheds of Rangpur Pauro Bazar damaged and a number of huge trees uprooted.

The sun remained invisible for the last ten days over a wide area causing an impact on prices of foodstuff. Lack of drying facilities swelled prices of rice, flour and pulse in the

UNB adds: An old man died in Pabna Sadar thana as temperature in the region dropped further with drizzles and strong winds that continued for the last 12 hours.

The dead was identified as Sudip Saha, 65, of village Bajitpur who died early yesterday morning due to shivering cold, villagers said.

There had been scattered drizzles which began early on Saturday. Normal life in the town was disrupted and most people stayed indoors.

This is only a token repatriation and the full process will begin in a couple of months and the next phase will involve 3000 families," he
