The repatriation of the first batch, scheduled to take place in December last year, was postponed by Pakistan because of flooding in the Punjab province and non-completion of construction of the houses for the repatriated Pakistanis.

The Rabita Assistant Secrctary General said that the second batch would be repatriated by the next six months.

It was an emotional homegoing for the total 63 families in the first batch. The turnees looked excited and their faces beaming while many shed tears bidding farewell to their relatives who would follow them in course of time. Earlier in the morning, the

Pakistan citizens were brought from the Adamjeenagar and Mirpur refugee camps to a temporary transit camp within the airport compound.

Under the canopied makeshift transit camp, the refugees had their farewell breakfast in Bangladesh and received travel documents from the
