# Article Article US, allies strike Iraq

WASHINGTON, Jan 13: US and Allied warplanes launched taids on Iraq on Wednesday in retaliation for Baghdad's continued violations of Gulf war ceasefire terms, administration officials said, reports Reuter.

A military source in Paris said French Mirage 2000 fighters were escorting in Allied bombers.

British Royal Air Force Tornado fighter-bombers were also taking part in an Allied air raid Wednesday on Iraq, government sources in London

Earlier, a defiant Iraq stood firm today, saying it was determined to regain Kuwait and would fight off any attack.

A spokesman for President Saddam Hussein said Kuwait was an "integral part of Iraq" and would return to Baghdad's control regardless of the United States and UN Security Council.

NBC's correspondent at the Pentagon, Fred Francis, said US fighters took off from the Carrier Kitty Hawk in the Gulf and from four bases in Saudi

"They are very limited air strikers," he said and quoted one Bush administration official as saying:

"It's just a spanking for

Saddam, not a real beating." Francis said the attack had

been scheduled for Monday but had to be put off because of bad weather until around noon EST (1700 GMT) on Tuesday.

The administration officials, who asked not to be identified, told Reuters that a raid had been launched after dark on Wednesday night, Iraq time. Iraq is eight hours ahead of US Eastern Standard Time, three hours ahead of GMT.

The officials would not provide any further details. The Defence Department


flatly refused comment although Pentagon officials said earlier that the US aircraft

Carrier Kitty Hawk was standing by in the Gulf with navy warplanes to respond to any order from the White House.

More than 100 other US, British and French warplanes are also based in the Gulf.

The Administration officials had confirmed earlier that President Goerge Bush and the allies had made a decision to launch the raid after repeated warnings from both the United Nations and the Western allies to Iraq's President Saddam Hussein to stop violations of ceasefire accords.
