## School Admission Conundrum

At the beginning of every year, we are faced with the lingering problem of school admission. This year has been no exception. By this time, in many of the schools, admission tests have been completed. From the statistics of vacant seats and the number of candidates for those seats, as ascertained, it appears that the pressure of admission seekers is greater on those schools, both government and private, which carry a good name. In some schools, the total num-What is the reason for ber of admission seekers is ten to fifteen times the number of vacancies in a class. There was an extreme case in the Government Laboratory High School: for 180 seats in class I,

4500 candidates took the test. There are 16 government boys' and 8 girls' schools in Dhaka. For obvious reasons, they bear the brunt of the admission pressure. It appears that this year the Secondary and Higher Secondary Education Board, Dhaka took a step, though palliative in nature, instructing all government schools under it to admit 10 per cent more students than last year in all classes. The Board sources also pointed out that it has already introduced, where feasible, double shifts in some schools to ease the pressure. The Government Laboratory School operates three shifts.

Sources in the Primary Education Directorate said that, in view of the government decision to introduce compulsory primary education in the whole country from this year, there is no problem of admission in government primary schools, as they are under obligation to accept all students who seek admission. There is, however, a snag here. Covernment primary schools are mostly attended by students of poorer classes. This class distinction tends to compound the problem of admission in the lower classes of the high schools, both government and private. There is also a prevailing notion that government primary schools are poor in standard and facili-

greater admission pressure on certain schools than on others? The obvious answer is the image such schools have built up by virtue of their academic performance. Even in respect of government schools, such common notion of differential image operates. This aspect of the problem was raised in discussion with a high-level source in the Education Board. As learnt from the Board, to narrow down any gap in standard among government schools, the Board has been steadily working for balanced development of all the schools under it. Under this policy, appropriate transfer of teachers is made from time to time to shore up image of such schools where there is need

There is another aspect of the problem. The general idea of difference in standard operates not only in respect of government schools but also between government schools on the one hand and private schools on the other. Some private schools enjoy a reputation equal to that of the best government schools. Notwith-

standing this, it is felt, by and large, some private schools lack in satisfactory standard. In this context, it may contribute to the easing of pressure on the good schools if the existing gap in standard between the two categories of schools can be bridged over with recrui tment of suitable teachers and provision of relevant facilities

Government perhaps has not much control over private schools in admission matters. It, however, seems they will be well-advised if, as in the case of government schools, they also allow 10 per cent more admission in all classes this year. Sometimes in private schools, the admission procedure is vitiated by the system of accepting donations or other substantial gifts. Such a system only puts a premium on extra-academic considerations at the expense of merit.

In the opinion of observers,

to meet the challenge of the needs of the burgeoning student population, long-term planning for building educational infra-structure is necessary. That, however, involves considerable financial outlay and a time factor. In the short term, it is felt, the private schools should be encouraged to play a greater role in tackling admission problems as per guidelines to be given by government. To counter the notion of image differential among the schools, greater attention needs be paid to improve the standard of those schools lagging behind, so that no situation arises where there are vacant seats in some schools and an inordinate pressure on others.

### Accident claims 6 more Ijtema-bound men

Six devotees were killed when a minibus bound for the Tongi Biswa litema rammed the railings of a bridge and fell into the river below in Narsingdi district early Friday.

Another 11 persons were injured in the accident which took place at about 2-30 am at the bridge near Marjia of Raipura thana of the district.

The injured were admitted to the Dhaka Medical College

The minibus was carrying From Our Corr devotees from the Kanaighat thana in Sylhet district.

In a similar accident on early Thursday, eight devotees were killed and another 47 injured when a bus from Jessore hit a bridge railings and fell into the river Isamati at Uthuli of Shibalaya thana in Manikganj district, 79 kilome tres off Dhaka.

The victims included the brother of a minister.

In Narsingdi accident, four persons died on the spot while two others succumbed to their injuries at the Narayangani Hospital. Our Narayangani corre

spondent said that all the victims, except Irfanullah (45) of Kanaighat, remained unidenti-

reports: The injured admitted to the hospital were: Abul Kashem (40), Abdul Khaleq (30), Siddik Ali (30), Mashuk Ahmed (35), Abdul Noor (30), Abu Sukkur (25), Fariduddin (17), Abu Ahmed (40), Abu Syeed (20) and two other unidentified males.

### 4 die of diarrhoea at ijtema camp

From Our Correspondent GAZIPUR, Jan 15: At least four devotees died today at Tongi as diarrhoea broke out at a camp built for the partici-

pants of Biswa Ijtema. Another 150 were given treatment for diarrhoea and other diseases. Of the diarrhoea affected patients two were taken to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) in a critical condition.

Of the four dead two died at the Tongi Hospital and two others at the litema ground. They were identified as Abed Ali (55) of Sokhipur of Tangail district and Abdul Majid (90) of Bannapara of the Haluaghat thana of the Mymensingh district. The names of two others could not be known.

In Bombay, Muslims today waved black flags and hurled curses at Prime Minister Narasimha Rao as he toured areas of the metropolis bruised by 10 days of non-stop religious strife.

Security forces cordoned off south-central city districts and ordered residents not to come out of their homes as a motorcade carrying Rao wound its way through streets littered with wreckage of cars and trucks, witnesses said.

You have hatched a conspiracy to finish off the Muslims," screamed Muslims at Reay Road as the premier on a day's trip to riot-hit Bombay cruised through the partly gut ted residential and business district, they said.

Police said Rao, during his 90-minute tour visited at least six of the 14 riot-torn neighbourhoods but did not stop to talk to people.

Reuter says, Rao warned India today it was in danger of breaking apart if communal hatred that triggered in Bombay was allowed to fester and spread.

"If this country forsakes secularism it will break. I am absolutely convinced of that," Rao told reporters after touring riot-hit areas of Bombay.

Meanwhile, former Prime Minister, V P Singh, leading a band of his supporters, today began an indefinite fast at 'Hutatma Chowk' here, describing his act as an appeal for peace in the riot-ravaged megapolis.

"I want to share the sorrow of the bereaved families," Singh, observing silence, scribbled on a piece of paper responding to journalists' queries, as he sat at the pandal surrounded by scores of securitymen.

Singh said "If all of us introspect and eschew appeals of hatred, a path will be found." He was joined by Janata Dal's state unit leaders including Mrs Mrinal Gore, Mrs Pramila Dandavate and others.

The mission 'reminded' that although the Government of Bangladesh is financing the plant and the Project Implementation Unit (PIU) of the Petrobangla is executing the implementation supervision contract, "these two activities are still within the legal framework of the Development Credit Agreement and Project Agreement for the Second Gas Development Project."

The government decided to pay for the project after the World Bank had refused to endorse the terms of the contract, awarded to a Canadian company, following a second evaluation of bids from three technically responsive firms with financial proposals revised, and the subsequent expiry of the closing date of the credit.

The Petrobangla's taking more than a year to decide on the contract and delays at various other control points also led to the lapse of the credit. The money may now be diverted to the proposed Third Gas Development Project.

But the Canadian company, the Colt Engineering Corporation, failed to sign the contract, initialled November 9 last year, within the stipulated time and consequently the Petrobangla encashed the bid bond worth 150,000 US dollars on November 26.

About the foggy weather in the beginning of January. Hamiduzzaman said fog is very normal during winter.

"Nevertheless, persisting thick fog starting at night upto mid-day covering almost the entire country for consecutive five days is somewhat not very common."

Sufficient moisture, fall in temperature and prevailing light wind during the winter are instrumental to thick fog, he added.

Asked about the storm that lashed the country's north and north-eastern districts recently, the Met Office Director said these were "violent thunderstorms" not uncommon but unusual for this time of the

"For example, also in January last year, we experienced thunderstorm with strong gusty wind over Dhaka, Sylhet, Khulna, Jessore, Barisal, Feni, Faridpur and Pabna." Explaining, he said January

is not the month of tornado in Bangladesh. It usually starts in March and continues upto onset of monsoon in middle or end of May.

"Tornado is very common in Bangladesh during March and April of which April is the most ideal," the Met Office Director said.

He said that tornado forecasting cannot be done because of its peculiar movement, short duration and very fast development.
