Describing it as a "dastardly act in history", he said "it is not only a shame for history but is also a shame for society". He asserted that it was not a "sudden" incident as the BJP prepared for nine long years. "We had expected the Indian government to take adequate steps. . . but it failed to do so because of a compromise with religion based politics."

Noting that the House was unanimous in condemning the act and for demanding the reconstruction of the mosque, Menon pleaded for a unanimous stand against the destruction of mandirs in the country immediately after the December 6 incident in Ayodhya.

"Where am I going to hide the shame that we could not protect the places of worship of the minority community here," he asked.

In a joint statement the leaders said they are resigning from the primary membership of the party for what they called 16 disgraceful 'policy of the Rao government on Ayodhya matter causing anarchy all over the country."
